1. CALL TO ORDER

The Chairman called the CCU Special Meeting of May 10, 2019 to order at 4:19 p.m. He said four (4) Commissioners were present and that there was a quorum; Comm. Santos was off-island and excused. Others in attendance include:

2. COMMUNICATIONS

2.1 Public Comments

Mr. Ken Guerrero, representative for Citizens for Public Accountability, address the Commission. Chairman Duenas welcomed him saying that he is allowed 2 minutes. Mr. Guerrero said he comes with 1000 signatures from citizen ratepayers and thinks this allows him more than 2 minutes. The Chairman said Mr. Guerrerp can have 5-minutes because the Commission needs to get on with its business. Mr. Guerrero started by saying that the actions of the Board has sparked such an outrage. There is a perception in the public that this body is very arrogant that this body perceives itself above the people that elected them to represent them. The public sees the action of this body to be more in line to be self-serving than representing the public. He said this utility is owned by the ratepayers and the CCU needs to do a better job listening to what the public has to say and take those things into considerations. If the CCU gives bonuses that are equal to or larger than the average salary on Guam it is a gross injustice and we consider that a big problem. The average income on Guam is \$26,400 according GovGuam Dept. of Labor. Guam has a very small utility system but GPA/GWA is paying salaries that are comparable to utility systems with more than a million customers. The public are having a hard time understanding why the salaries, bonus and raises are as high as they are with very little improvement in the system or the service. There's lot of pain in the public and there is no sympathy and support from CCU that supposedly represent the ratepayers. He said the perception is that ratepayers work for you and that your job is to get as much as money from ratepayers as you can. The CCU has Legal Counsels that got you into this mess and you need to rethink their value – use the AG's office and safe nearly \$400k per year for ratepayers. He said he and 1000 other ratepayers expect that the CCU does not move forward with salaries and bonuses until it can be justified to the ratepayers.

Comm. Sanchez questioned the absence of both Legal Counsels and the Chairman said because of the conflict they thought it best the outside counsel handle the meeting. Comm. Sanchez said; for the record, that he thinks it is appropriate that senior management is present to witness the discussion in open session. They are part of senior management. They played a critical role on what happened and it is prudent for them to listen to the discussion with outside counsel as well. Being conflicted doesn't mean that they cannot be here. The Chairman said they are not physically here. Comm. Guthertz said that she also would also like to speak with the staff attorneys.

3. GPA

3.1 New Business

3.1.1 <u>To Address Letter Received by the CCU From the Guam Attorney General Regarding the</u> <u>November 27, 2018 CCU Meeting and Other Related Matters</u>

Outside Counsel Vince Leon Guerrero said he was asked to appear to render an opinion as to the validity of the letter from the Attorney General to the Commission wherein the AG advised the Commission that pay raises and bonuses were improper because they were discussed and approved during the Executive Session of the CCU meeting of November 27, 2018. Counsel said his research agrees with the opinion of the AG. The law is specific if salary is to be discussed it has to be done in an open public; if evaluation is to be done – that it can be done in private. He said the bottom line is he concurs with the AG's opinion and the CCU action must be void, the increases must be rescinded and the bonuses paid back.

Relative to repayment Counsel Leon Guerrero said there is no statute guiding how repayment is to be made however a similar issue happened not too long ago with the Governor's Office and employees there were allowed to effect the payback over term.

Counsel Leon Guerrero then reiterated that the CCU is charged with evaluating and setting the salaries for the (2) General Managers, the (2) CFO's, the (2) Legal Counsels and the Board Secretary. Asst. GM of Operation's salary is brought before the CCU on the recommendation of the GM and the CCU vote to approve or not approve the salary.

The Chairman then opened the floor to questions.

Comm. Sanchez said he wants to make clear he understands that the CCU enabling act authorizes by law to evaluate and approve performances – particularly for (6) people - to hire, fire, discipline, raise or cut pay for who he called the CCU 7 - the (2) GM's, CFO's, Counsel's and Bd. Secretary. The issue is what must be done in open session and what can / is allowed to be done in executive session. Comm. Sanchez then read that section of the AG's letter relative to the specific open government law that the AG cited specifically [reads the open govt. law verbatim] and ended by reconfirming with counsel that evaluations are ok in private but once salary is discussed it must be in the open / in public. Counsel Leon Guerrero concurred.

Comm. Sanchez then referenced the Counsel's opinion about the Asst. GM of Operations. He asked Counsel if the CCU sets the AGMO's pay because he thought the CCU does not have power to set AGMO's pay - Counsel responded - yes. Counsel said that the GM of GPA sets the salary subject to board approval. The GM evaluates the AGMO and the CCU approves. Simon so in fact there are 8 people that CCU can set pay for but any discussion relative to pay must be in public and any evaluations can be done in private. Counsel concurred.

Comm. Sanchez then asked about the other (4) Asst. GM's – Administration – one for power and other for water, Engineering & Technical Services for power, Compliance & Safety for water does CCU have power to set their pay; Counsel - he did not see that in the law and Comm. Sanchez said he didn't either. Comm. Sanchez said there are 800 employees at GPA and GWA the GMs set their pay and CCU has no power over pay; counsel said yes. Comm. Sanchez then said if the CCU has no power over the (4) Asst. GM's salary then just like they have no power over the 800 line employees of GPA and GWA why should the Asst. GM's salary increases be rescinded. At this point the Chairman injected and reminded Comm. Sanchez that the AG's letter was specific - that money was talked about in executive session and because of that the action was void - that is the point. Comm. Sanchez said money was talked about in executive session for people the Commission has no power over? He said he would like an opinion. Counsel Leon Guerrero said he would look into this matter and render an opinion. Comm. Sanchez said for the record that he listened to the audio and will listen to it again. He said he does not remember any discussion on pay for these (4) Asst. General Managers would like guidance for these particular managers. Comm. Michael injected to get opinion directly of the AG as well on the (4) AGM's because he may not know any of the fine details just discussed. Comm. Sanchez said there may be other matters that may emerge that we would like the AG's opinion as well. A lawyer's opinion is all it is an opinion and only the courts that matters but it

is opinions that guide us. In the same spirit of Comm. Limtiaco there may be other things that we may ask the AG to opine and would like to add on if needed.

Comm. Limitaco said that he was not present at the November 27th Executive Session because he was not a Commission member at the time, having been inducted in January 2019. His question is 1) does he as a CCU member now, does he have access to these executive session minutes and 2) does the AG have access to the executive session minutes. He said Counsel cited the section of law that speaks about personnel matters so does the AG have access? Comm. Limitaco said he does not think that he does but wants the Counsels opinion.

Comm. Guthertz said she is happy that this meeting is going on and wants to make correction where needed. The Commissioner cited section 5GCA, the Sunshine Reform Act, Limitation of Right of Inspection Chapter 10, of law about privacy issues. The law specifically states in section 10108 except as provided in 10109 of this chapter that Personnel medical or similar files the disclosure of which will constitute an unwarranted invasion of personnel privacy. All information about salary, names etc. shall remain of record. The Commissioner said her interpretation of this is the CCU is prohibited from disclosing personnel files. Obviously there is great interest about the evaluation of our employees. If we were requested of this information would we be in violation if we release it. Counsel confirmed yes. Comm. Guthertz mentioned that the CCU Board Secretary was asked and she declined because of the provision of this law which was the correct action on her part as it would be the correct action on our part. Counsel concurred. She said the remedy should someone want to challenge this would be to take this matter to court; Counsel concurred. Comm. Guthertz said that she wanted this on the record because she has delt with personnel matters before and it has always been her experience that these matters cannot be disclosed. She stated that it was not the intent of anyone on this Commission to do any thing in contravention and she is looking forward to correcting the issue immediately. She is saddened by this episode and is committed to do the right thing at all times and hopes that the Commission will have the understanding of the employees who were affected that it was never the intent.

Comm. Limtiaco had a question on - Section 8111 Executive Session of the Open Govt. Law as it related to Section 8113 relative to the Minutes. Section 8111, Section 7 talks about the 6-month seal of transcripts – the question is this just in relation to subsection c – for legal matters only. For these personnel matters do they ever become public record – Counsel said no. For those section that discusses salaries these can be made public and Counsel said yes. Comm. Limtiaco said there may be sections of the discussion where salaries and evaluations may be intertwined. I would like to make a motion to release those portions of the meeting minutes that discuss salaries and if needed redact those portions that are protected under the personnel sections and he wants to discuss this motion.

Chairman Duenas asked about the liability about inadvertently releasing something. Counsel said if employees rights are infringed this is the big concern. There was discussion on releasing this type of information – if someone wants the Minutes they can go to court. Chairman Duenas said if a court orders the release it is different because it is coming from the court. The Chairman said he would not vote on a motion to release Minutes and then be liable. If a court releases the CCU will not be liable. Comm. Limtiaco said he understands and is sensitive to this and the potential liability. If there is any way that some portions can be redacted and release

the information on salaries he would like to do so. Comm. Limitaco said perhaps Counsel can give his legal opinion.

Comm. Sanchez said once again evaluations, personnel records are protected. If we were to redact would Counsel be willing to redact it for the Commission. There is the public's right to know and the employees right to privacy. He asked if Counsel would review and recommend to the Commission what he would redact.

Comm. Guthertz also wanted Counsel to research and opine that if the affected employees would agree to discuss their evaluations in public despite the provisions in the sunshine law that it would be their decision and the Commission would not be liable.

Comm. Sanchez said in review the Counsel will look at specific issue of the (4) Asst. GM's that were impacted but not under the responsibility of the CCU are their pay raises valid. Comm. Sanchez asked Counsel to review the list of requested opinions / deliverables to the Commission.

Counsel listed the following -1) Comm. Limtiaco's question if the AG has access to Ex. Session Minutes 2) Whether Limtiaco has access to Minutes 3) Matter of the (4) Asst. GM's that CCU has no responsibility over 4) Redaction of the Minutes 4) Waiver of Employees rights

Comm. Limtiaco said after all this discussion there are many items that are still pending opinions but for those where the law is clear he motioned that the pay raises be rescinded and returned; second by Comm. Guthertz.

In discussion Comm. Sanchez asked how the monies are to be repaid – Counsel said there is no statute that he could find. Counsel said he could ask the AG's office for an opinion. There was discussion that at the Gov's Office incident employees were allowed the payback in terms. At this point there was no decision as to the time frame for payback.

Comm. Guthertz motioned to amend main motion to revert the salaries of the GM's of GPA and GWA, the CFO of GPA, the Legal Counsels of GPA and GWA and the CCU Board Secretary to levels of pay of 11/27/18; second by Comm. Limtiaco.

In discussion on payback there was no mention of timeframe for payment and will await for Counsel Opinion.

On the amended motion the vote was (4) ayes, (1) absent

For clarity Comm. Sanchez asked for the motion to be restated one more time to be ensure everyone is on the same page.

Comm. Limtiaco said the motion is to return the pay raises that were received by the GM for GPA & GWA, the CFO of GPA the Legal Counsel of GPA and GWA and the CCU Board Secretary and to restore salaries back to the Nov. 27, 2018 salary level.

The Vote was (4); absent (1) – the motion carried.

There was discussion about the questions that the Commission has asked outside counsel to opine on and the draft letter to the AG to opine on these same questions. There was discussion if a motion is required. Counsel said he does not think a motion is necessary but Comm. Guthertz would like it for the record. The Chairman recommended to ask Counsel to draft the letter to the AG relative to his opinion and for the Commission to review the AG's letter beforehand. All agreed.

There was discussion on how long it would take to draft the letter and for Counsel to formulate his own opinion. Chairman Duenas said he would like to give outside counsel time to draft the letter. It was decided to recess this meeting and Counsel can present his opinion and the AG draft letter at the continuation meeting.

Comm. Limtiaco asked Counsel to opine on bonuses and Counsel said there is a prohibition on bonuses.

Comm. Limtiaco motioned that bonuses that were approved on Nov. 27, 2018 be repaid; second by Comm. Guthertz.

Comm. Guthertz stated that since bonuses are not allowed the only way to recognize someone is through a continuing salary adjustment. There was discussion on classified and contract employees and it was clarified that the employees in question are classified not contract employees.

Comm. Guthertz motioned to recess the meeting until Tues., May 14 at 4 p.m.; second by Comm. Sanchez

Kelly Clark

The Chairman said that where we left off at last meeting, outside legal counsel was to prepare a draft letter to the Attorney General which he forwarded to the Commission in advance. The Chairman also reported that since the last meeting (3) additional FOIA requests have been received for a total of (4) to include one sent by Mr. Ken Leon Guerrero. The others were from Mr. Kevin Kerrigan, Mr. Steve Limtiaco and Mr. Robert Klitzkie.

Comm. Sanchez said the CCU has not been able to collectively respond to any of the FOIA's and today is a good opportunity for comment.

Counsel Leon Guerrero said he sent the Commission the proposed draft and he received some comments from the Commissioners. There were (4) questions to ask the AG's opinion, if the Commission agrees.

Counsel said the first is relative to the Asst. General Managers. Comm. Sanchez raised the issue as to whether the Asst. GM's pay raises are supposed to be done by the General Manager with no input from the CCU and would the raises to the Asst. GM's be valid. Counsel said his initial opinion is that the pay raises should be rescinded and repaid. His concern is that the related GG1's for at least (2) of the Asst. GM's were signed by a Commissioner and there is notation at the bottom of the GG1 that says "per CCU Executive Session of Nov. 27. 2018". It was clarified that the (2) GG1's in question were for the Asst.GM of Administration and the Asst. GM of the Engineering & Technical Service. The Asst. GM of Operations was discussed at the last meeting and it was brought forward that the CCU is responsible to approve the pay of the AGMO along with the GM's the CFO's the Legal Counsels and the CCU Board Secretary.

Comm. Sanchez said he viewed that the fact that a Commissioner signed the GG1 is a ministerial issue. It could be that the General Manager was not on island – he speculates that in the absence of the GM a Commissioner, the Vice Chairman, signed on his behalf. It was noted that the Commissioner Duenas was also off-island.

If the CCU is not empowered by law to view, change or evaluate the AGM's what difference does it make that they were discussed in executive session. There was discussion on what the CCU Enabling

Act states and it was clarified that advise and consent of the CCU is required for the hiring of the Asst. GM of Operations. Relative to pay it is the responsibility of the GM to determine the pay with the approval of the Board.

Comm Duenas said that at the first meeting of May 10, there was a motion made to rescind the pay of the original seven (7) employees whose pay is determined by the CCU but in light of this clarification, it is now apparent that the AGMO's pay is also approved by the CCU and that any related pay increase be also rescinded.

Comm. Sanchez motioned to return the salary of the Asst. GM of Operations of GPA back to the level of pay of 11/27/18; second by Comm. Guthertz. There was no further discussion or objection and the motion passed unanimously.

On question on the Asst GM of Technology, Asst GM of Administration Counsel Leon Guerrero said that his concern is the GGI was signed by the CCU and notation on GGI mentioned action was taken during ex-session. It is his opinion is that these (2) raises were not valid because of his concerns.

It was clarified by the GM Bordallo that the Asst. GM of Compliance & Safety was evaluated via the usual pay for performance process and his salary information was provided for information purposes only and not for discussion or approval.

Comm. Duenas said that In reading the AG's letter the discussion in Executive Session about salary at that meeting makes them void; his opinion is that CCU rescind all of them but that we need to point out that (2) AGM's were included in the discussion but these 2 positions should not have been included and ask the AG to opine if the salaried for these 2 positions stand.

Comm. Limtiaco said he agrees and would like to rescind all of the salaries

A motion was made by Comm. Guthertz to rescind all the salaries for GM;s CFO, Legal Counsels, the AGMO, AGMA's and the AGMET; Comm. Limtiaco seconded.

Comm. Sanchez commended Comm. Limtiaco for his participation in the discussion and action stating that technically he is conflicted in this matter. Comm. Limtiaco said the discussion / decision is based upon the actions of the CCU as opposed to specific employees per se. He disclosed for the record that his wife Beatrice Limtiaco is the AGMA for GPA. Comm. Limtiaco seconded the motion to rescind the salary increases which includes the AGMA. Comm. Guthertz said this action conforms with the AG's guidance.

On the motion there was no further discussion or objection and the motion passed unanimously

Comm. Sanchez said it is important to note in the letter to the AG that at the 5/10 meeting the CCU rescinded the action and to be specific and list the salaries that were rescinded. He also said he is concerned about signing a letter that he did not see in final form.

Chairman Duenas said it is best if the CCU recesses this meeting again and entertain the final draft letter to the AG at a continuation meeting.

There was discussion returned to the body of the letter and the questions that Counsel has drafted to date. to notate the action of the Commission to date, to specifically list the names / positions of all whose pay were rescinded and the question about the (2) Asst. GM and who can sign GG1's

It was mentioned to get the counsels opinion to all the questions in addition to the AG's opinion

Discussion continued forward to other questions on the AG's draft letter listed here

1. Guidance on the salary adjustments of GPAs other assistant mangers who do not require CCU approval. At issue is the GG1's that were signed by a CCU Commissioner on behalf of the GM and the remarks section that referenced the salary was discussed in executive session?

Comm. Guthertz said signing of GG1's is managements responsibility and it might be unnecessary to ask this question. Comm. Duenas said it is a good question to ask. Comm. Sanchez said this matter is good to ask for all other Boards / Commissions on Guam. Does Guam Law allow the signing of the GG1 by a board member to be valid

- 2. the CCU requests whether or not current CCU Commissioners have access to executive session minutes from prior CCU Commissions that the Commissioners were not part of?
- 3. Whether not evaluations are personnel matters and should not be open to the public in compliance with 10GCA Section 10108 © and if they are protected by statute can these portions of the executive session minutes be redacted and the remaining minutes released?
- 4. In repaying of the improper salary adjustment can the affected employees pay back the money through a promissory note as was done during the last administration?
- 5. Can an employee named in the Executive Session waive his/her privacy interest and allow information concerning that particular employee be made public?

Relative to the FOIA's received to date, Counsel said he can review it and respond in a day. There was discussion on who responds to FOIA's if it is addressed to a board. Counsel said it is the Chairman who should respond if a FOIA is directed to a board. At the end of the discussion it was confirmed that the FOIA;s would be responded to by Thursday.

Comm. Limtiaco asked about the Executive Session Minutes and if non personnel matters contained in the discussion can be released. Chairman Duenas said he would rather have a judge release the information. Comm. Guthertz said it would be better to go directly to the court to ask them for their judgement because they would give more clarity and response would be more definitive. Counsel said that the CCU cam file a declaratory judgement with the Court. Comm. Guthertz said it would be good for the Commission to inform the AG of what the CCU is doing or planning to do. The value is that the court action would be good for other boards as well.

Chairman Duenas said for clarity, the CCU has rescinded all the pay increases and bonuses and established that the increases must be repaid. The priority is to get counsel's opinions to the questions, to respond to the FOIA's and then based on counsel's opinion to move to court action where matters can be considered further. The Chairman said he wants to make a point that he was

never advised by anybody about the salary discussion.in executive session. What's important is that CCU is seeking best action / outcome within the law.

Comm. Guthertz motioned to recess the meeting until 4 p.m on Tuesday, May 21; second by Comm. Limtiaco. There was no further discussion objection and the meeting was recessed. It was 5:45 p.m.

2. CALL TO ORDER

The Chairman called the Continuation Meeting of the CCU Special Meeting of May 10, 2019 to order at 4:00 p.m. He said this is a continuation of a meeting that started on May 10th, continued on May 14th and recessed for further continuation today. At last meeting VLG was tasked to prepare letter to the AG but since meeting CCU was served a suit and CCU needs to respond in 10 days, or by May 31. Many of the things included in the summons would have been included in the letter to the AG. Since there is a litigation going on now perhaps the Commission should consider going into executive session to discuss this further.

The Chaima said there is no Executive Session schedule for today's meeting so the Commission cannot go into executive session today. There is an exective session scheduled for next Tuesday, 5/28 and the Commission could bring this matter to the table at that meeting. This pending litigation could be discussed then. Counsel said that he is waiting for SEG designation by the AG.

To recap the Chairman said the Board took action to rescind all the pay raises and bonuses and to require that the money be paid back. This was to appy to the GM's CFO, Legal Counsels and the Board Secretary. Also rescinded were the pay for the AGMO, AGMA and AGMET. While these positions do not fall under the responsibility of the Commission what happened was the respective GG1's noted that the salary increase was discussed in executive session of 11/27/18 so all related pay was also rescinded as per the AG's initial opinion. There was a request for some questions that Counsel was to ask the AG's opinion and that of Counsel. Counsel Leon Guerreo concurred that there were questions but that these should be addressed during Executive Session.

Comm. Limitaco said that he does not feel that the legal opinions openly discussed at the past 2 meetings and requested Counsel to opine on should be discussed openly at this meeting since we have already openly discussed them nin the past. Counsel said that some of the questions would be ok to discuss openly but there are others that he feels enfringe on the lawsuit and should not be discussed. Comm. Limitaco said the lawsuit was relative ot releasing the executive session minutes in its totality and some of the other questions are more specific and have already been discussed in past meetings so he does not understand why the discussion cannot happen now rather than at an executive session. All the questions that CCU asked Cousel to opine on should he recommends to discuss at this meeting.

Counsel said what was agreed upon was the issue of salary adjustment is pubic knowledge via GG1 anyway but when you listen to the tape and you take out the salary adjustment portion the rest has to do with evaluation and if it is not releasable they must be redacted. He said he does not know if evaluations can be extracted fron pay adustment if these are taken out there is not much left. If CCU takes this to court, for the protection of the enployees privacy the court will decide what is releasable and what is not.

Chairman Dueans asked the fact that a litigation is filed, does this now change the dynamics off the meeting we are having and Counsel said it could. He recommended talking to the AG and how to go about handling the lawsuit that;s why he reconnends not discussing this matter further.

Comm. Sanchez asked what the suit filed by Mr. Leon Guerrero is asking. Counsel explaned that he suing us to disclose the full discussion at the executive session – all minutes, notes, rcordings etc. so that is everything.

Comm. Sanchez asked if Counsel had a chance to listen to the recording of the meeting and asked if there was discussion on salary and salary adjustment and Counsel said yes. If the Minutes were released what would be the penalties in law for releasing the discussion. Counsel said the employee could sue the CCU for discussing their evaluations in public, good or bad. The Commissioner said that

the discussion in executive session was all positive – everyone got an increase. The risk the CCU runs is that the managers that got a raise could sue the Commission. The risk of not releasing it due to FOIA request there could be a \$1000 fine.

Comm. Guthertz shared that evaluations is a very sensitive area and the Commission should exercise caution relative to releasing executve session Minutes containing personnel information citing her experience while at GPD.

Comm. Michael said he was not at the exeutive session and wanted the opportunity to listen and to get input from other Commissiomers. He said he understands Comm. Guthertz's concern but this is a little different and Comm. Michael Limtiaco said I motion to release the Minutes; second by Comm. Simon Sanchez

Vote was recorded via Roll Call accordingly: Sanchez – vote yes to release Limtiaco – vote yes to release Duenas – vote no to release Guthertz – vote no to release Santos – vote yes to release

There were a couple of other motions that were brought to the floor for voting, in particular:

Comm. Guthertz motioned to respond to the Attorney General's letter of rescinding of pay, requirement of repayment and release of the Minutes. Second by Comm. Santos. There was no objection and the motion passed unanimously.

Comm. Guthertz motion to ask the Court via declaratory judgement for definitive interpretation of 5 GCA Chapter 10 regarding personnel matters specifically if it includes employment, evaluations and discipline; second by Comm. Santos. There was no objection and the vote was unanimous.

What is the project's objective and is it necessary and urgent?

This resolution seeks CCU approval to increase the project fund authorization to address an unresolved claim from the contractor involving additional excavation necessary to meet/hit hard stable ground surfaces and filling up of flowable fill at the new SPS that was deemed by the contractor as additional work. The contractor ultimately moved forward with completing the new SPS so that the project can progress however the claim stayed unresolved. GWA's project engineers/Chief Engineer have further reviewed the claim and agree that additional work and material were used and as such approve the claim. RELATIVE TO APPROVAL OF CHANGE ORDER TO THE BAZA GARDENS WASTEWATER CROSS-ISLAND PUMPING AND CONVEYANCE SYSTEM PHASE II CONTRACT

WHEREAS, under 12 G.C.A. § 14105, the Consolidated Commission on Utilities ("CCU") has plenary authority over financial, contractual, and policy matters relative to the Guam Waterworks Authority ("GWA"); and

WHEREAS, the Guam Waterworks Authority ("GWA") is a Guam Public Corporation established and existing under the laws of Guam; and

WHEREAS, to meet a mandate of the 2011 federal Court Order regarding the Baza Gardens Wastewater Treatment Plant (WWTP), GWA elected to remove the treatment plant from operation and to instead pump the wastewater to the new (under construction) Agat-Santa Rita WWTP; and

WHEREAS, due to schedule and funds constraints, the project was divided into three phases (I, II and III) and three separate construction contracts, extending from the Baza Gardens WWTP, across Route 17 (cross-island road), and terminating at the entrance to the new Agat-Santa Rita WWTP on Route 2A; and

WHEREAS, the CCU approved via Resolution 01-FY2017 a total funding authorization for Phase I with BME & Sons in the amount of Eight Million Two Hundred Eighty-Two Thousand Five Hundred Fifty-Eight Dollars and Seventy-Five Cents (\$8,282,558.75); via Resolution 13-FY2017 a total funding authorization for Phase II with BME & Sons in the amount of Six Million Two Hundred Fourteen Thousand Nine Hundred Ninety-Seven Dollars and Seventy Cents (\$6,214,997.70) and via Resolution 29-FY2017 a total funding authorization

for Phase III with Sumitomo-Mitsui Construction Company in the amount of Sixteen Million
 Three Hundred Seven Thousand Four Hundred Thirty Six Dollars and Sixty Cents
 (\$16,307,436.60); and

WHEREAS, the portion of the gravity conveyance system along the entrance road (from Route 2A to the Agat-Santa Rita WWTP site) that is 0.5 miles long was not included in Phase I, II or III of the Cross-Island project as it was deemed in 2016 that the contractor for the new Agat-Santa Rita WWTP project might be better positioned to more cost-effectively execute the gravity line installation work; and

WHEREAS, as of September 2018, the contractor for Phase I of the subject project completed gravity line installation along Route 2A and reached the entrance road to the new Agat Santa Rita WWTP and the contractor for the new WWTP unfortunately was not ready to execute additional scope related to installing of the gravity line along the entrance roadway; and

WHEREAS, due to efforts to comply with Court Order deadlines related to the Baza Gardens WWTP as best as possible, GWA management executed Change Order #4 with BME & Sons, Inc., (Phase II Contract) to install part of the 21-inch diameter gravity sewer along the entrance roadway to the new WWTP to complete the wastewater conveyance system; and

WHEREAS, the execution of Change Order #4 related to the 21-inch gravity line installation depleted the contingency funds approved via CCU Resolution No. 13-FY2017 for Phase II contract; and

WHEREAS, GWA subsequently received additional funding authorization in the amount of One Hundred Forty-One Thousand Eight Hundred Seventy-Two Dollars and Seventy-Eight Cents (\$141,872.78) for the Phase II contract via CCU Resolution 52-FY2018 that addresses unexpected costs for endangered species mitigation measures, unexpected buried utilities in the Navy right-of-way, as well as various sites changes that impacted project cost; and

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WHEREAS, the approval of CCU Resolution 52-FY2018 increased the total authorized funding for the Phase II contract to Six Million Three Hundred Fifty-Six Thousand Eight Hundred Seventy Dollars and Forty-Eight Cents (\$6,356,870.48); and

WHEREAS, GWA further executed two Change Orders using the fund authorization from Resolution 52-FY2018 which brought the contract value with BME & Sons for Phase II to Six Million Three Hundred Fifty Thousand Eight Hundred Twenty-Two Dollars and Nine Cents (\$6,350,822.09); and

WHEREAS, GWA is working towards wrapping up all pending items to close the contract and one unresolved claim from the contractor involves additional excavation to meet hard stable ground surfaces and filling up of flowable fill at the new SPS for which GWA has finally agreed to the claim after further discussion with the CM and geotechnical engineer; and

WHEREAS, the contractor's claim for additional excavation to the SPS as noted above is Fifteen Thousand Two Hundred Twenty-Two Dollars and Fifty-Five Cents (\$15,222.55) (See Exhibit A) and the balance of the funding authorization is insufficient to cover thus GWA management is seeking CCU approval to increase the project fund authorization so as to be able to execute a Change Order and close this contractor claim; and

WHEREAS, the approval of this resolution will bring the total authorized funding for Phase II to Six Million Three Hundred Seventy-Two Thousand Ninety-Three Dollars and Three Cents (\$6,372,093.03); and

WHEREAS, funding for this project will be from wastewater bond funds applicable to the project; and

NOW BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED, the Consolidated Commission on Utilities does hereby approve the following:

The construction contractor of Phase III, Sumitomo Mitsui Construction Company (SMCC), has submitted to GWA time extension requests stating that the delay is due to inclement weather and sludge removal approximately 3,080 cubic yards were hauled and transported to Layon Landfill that push the completion of the project through June 2019.

Where is the location?

The project location is at the new Baza Gardens Pump Station (Phase III), Route 17/Route5 (Phase I & II).

How much will it cost?

GWA management still seeks CCU approval of additional funding not to exceed the amount of One Hundred Sixty Thousand Dollars (\$160,000.00) for the extended contract performance period through July 2019 including documentation of the project close out. Notwithstanding the fund increase request GWA will be negotiating down the fee proposal given the level of staffing and construction activities will ramp down towards the end of the construction period.

The approval of the One Hundred Sixty Thousand Dollars (\$160,000.00), which GWA will view on a Time and Materials basis, will bring the total authorized funding for the Construction Management contract to Three Million Three Hundred Thirty-Two Thousand Five Hundred Sixty-Four Dollars and Fifty-Nine Cents (\$3,332,564.59).

When will it be completed?

The actual construction completion is projected to be by June 2019 however GWA anticipates the CM services will extend to July 2019.

What is the funding source?

Funding for any Change Order to SSFM's contract moving forward will be from any available bond funds under the line item - WW 11-03 "Baza Gardens STP Replacement", and Internally Funded CIP funds as well as Liquidated Damages of \$3,000 per day from the contractor.

WHEREAS, under 12 G.C.A. § 14105, the Consolidated Commission on Utilities ("CCU") has plenary authority over financial, contractual and policy matters relative to the Guam Waterworks Authority ("GWA"); and

WHEREAS, the Guam Waterworks Authority ("GWA") is a Guam Public Corporation established and existing under the laws of Guam; and

WHEREAS, GWA currently has a number of critical Court Order ("CO") projects to
 include the Baza Gardens WWTP which has been recommended and approved to be converted to
 a sewer pumping station to transfer/convey wastewater flows from the Baza Gardens/Talofofo
 wastewater basin across the Route 17 (Cross Island Road) to a new Agat-Santa Rita WWTP site;
 and

WHEREAS, in February 2016 GWA management entered into a contract with Duenas Camacho and Associates to design the wastewater conveyance and pumping system which includes new Sewer Pump Station (SPS), gravity mains, force mains and all incidentals and appurtenances to these main components; and

 WHEREAS, GWA management further executed three separate construction contracts (Phases I, II&III) with Sumitomo Mitsui Construction Company (SMCC) and BME &Sons Incorporated (BME) to construct the new Conveyance System by April 16, 2018, per CCU Resolutions 01-FY2017, 13-FY2017 and 29-FY2017; and

WHEREAS, CCU further authorized via Resolution 02-FY2017 for GWA to execute a contract with SSFM, Inc. (SSFM) to provide construction management services in the amount not to exceed Two Million Eight Hundred Seventy-One Thousand Dollars (\$2,871,000.00); and

WHEREAS, GWA had subsequently executed the original contract with SSFM for an amount of Two Million Two Hundred Eighty-Five Thousand Two Hundred Sixty-Eight Dollars (\$2,285,268.00) as well as allotted Two Hundred Twenty-Eight Thousand Five Hundred Twenty-Six Dollars and Eighty Cents (\$228,526.80) as a ten percent (10%) contingency to the contract; and

WHEREAS, GWA further executed Change Order No. 1 in the amount of One Hundred Eighty-Five Thousand Six Hundred Ninety-One Dollars (\$185,691.00) which was covered under the original ten percent (10%) contingency; and

WHEREAS, CCU further authorized via Resolution 09-FY2019 in November 2018 an increase of fund authorization in the amount of Three Hundred One Thousand Five Hundred Sixty-Four Dollars and Fifty-Nine Cents (\$301,564.59) to bring the total authorized funding of Three Million One Hundred Seventy-Two Thousand Five Hundred Sixty-Four Dollars and Fifty-Nine Cents (\$3,172.564.59) to address continued Construction Management services past the original construction period date; and

WHEREAS, GWA had executed Change Order No. 2 in the amount of Six Hundred Two Thousand Seven Hundred Dollars and Fifty-Seven Cents (\$602,700.57) to bring the total contract value to Three Million Seventy-Three Thousand Six Hundred Fifty-Nine Dollars and Fifty-Seven Cents (\$3,073,659.57) which provided CM services up until April 30, 2019; and

WHEREAS, the overall construction project to date still has minor close out items for the Phase I and II contractor as well as remaining refurbish work at the existing clarify, civil works and SCADA for the Phase III contractor which still requires Construction Management services thus GWA will be working to execute a Change Order to cover CM services with the balance of the fund authorization which will only be until May 30, 2019; and

WHEREAS, the contractor for Phase III, SMCC, has submitted documentation to GWA 1 management (See Exhibit A) wherein they are stating the completion of construction activities is 2 now expected to extend through June 9, 2019 and are requesting approval for delay claims due to 3 inclement weather and removal and disposal of sludge at approximately 3,080 cubic yards that were hauled and disposed to Layon Landfill which was outside of the bid; and 5

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WHEREAS, notwithstanding the issues surrounding one of the contractor's delay and when ultimately GWA approves additional time extension and as means of allowing for continuity of construction management services as it relates to any construction extension due to contractor issues, GWA management finds CM Services is likely necessary through July 2019 to provide continued Construction Management Services; and

WHEREAS, GWA is negotiating with SSFM for a fee proposal to provide continued construction management services to July 2019 on a Time and Materials basis and part of this negotiation is for SSFM to take into account a reduction in staffing levels as the project reaches the end of the construction period; and

WHEREAS, to ensure timely execution of any forthcoming Change Order so that services are not stalled, GWA is seeking CCU approval of additional funding to a not to-exceed amount of One Hundred Sixty Thousand Dollars (\$160,000.00) for the extended contract performance period through July 2019; and

WHEREAS, funding for any Change Order to SSFM moving forward will be from any available bond funds under the line item - WW 11-03 "Baza Gardens STP Replacement", and Internally Funded CIP funds as well as Liquidated Damages of \$3,000 per day from the contractor; and

Dear Mr. Davis,

Thank you for sending a memo acknowledging portions of the project that are substantially complete as of December 31, 2018 and April 1, 2019, respectively.

We would like to request GWA not to impose Liquidated Damage from April 1st 2019, due to the reasons indicated below.

[Time Extension Request of 69days]

- 42 days of extension due to the difference of Bid Quantity of Sludge removal. Regarding sludge removal and disposal, while the anticipated quantity per contract was 30 cy, the actual quantity is expected to be more than 2500 cy. Based on actual 10 days hauling to GWA's drying bed recorded from March 13-29, 2019 to haul 2000 cy, to complete the remaining quantity of 500 cy to be hauled to Inarajan Landfill, we estimated a total extra time of 42 days for this increased scope of work. Please see attachment #1
- > 27 additional unworkable days comparing to project specification.

We lost unexpected working days due to unusually severe weather encountered for the months of August and September 2018. Rainy days exceeded 27 days compared to the average number of non-working days as indicated in the project specs Section 013216 Paragraph 2.2E. Please see attachment #2 and #3. [Status and Remaining Value of the Project]

Please also note that the facility is operational and was already functioning for its intended purpose as of April 1st, 2019. The remaining works you mentioned in your memo are correct. However, the total value of the remaining works, such as EQ Basin, building demolition, and miscellaneous site works are only about 6.9% of our total contract amount. Assessing the full daily rate of liquidated delay damages when the facility is operational seems inappropriate to us. Please see attachment #4.

SMCC will continue to use our best efforts to complete the remaining scope of work as early as possible until we obtain GWA and SSFM's full satisfaction.

SMCC therefore request time extension for the reasons set forth above. SMCC also request GWA's consideration to reduce the daily rate of Liquidated damage based on the completion and use situation described above if GWA still feels it necessary to impose Liquidated damages.

Resolution No. 28-FY2019

Relative to Approval of Change Order No. 01 to Construction Management Services for the GWA SCADA System for Water and Wastewater Facilities Phase A-1

What is the project's objective and is it necessary and urgent?

The project objective is primarily to install communication equipment on site to allow communication with Fadian SCADA servers. This also includes installation of instrumentation such as pressure and flow sensors as well as intrusion switches on site to record site conditions along with other existing instruments.

Resolution No. 29-FY2019

Relative to Approval of Change Order to the Yigo and Astumbo Reservoir Construction Management Contract

What is the project's objective and is it necessary and urgent?

The objective of the change order is to continue the construction management services for the Yigo No. 1, Yigo No. 3, and Astumbo No. 2 reservoir construction project and increase funding to the contract. The continued services are required due to delay by the contractor (Pernix) in completing the project. The Contractor has agreed through a Memorandum of Understanding to pay for the additional construction management cost for the duration of the project until final completion.

The Yigo and Astumbo Tank Construction project are Court Ordered thus the urgency is to complete the project as soon as possible but maintain adequate Construction Management oversight.

Where is the project located?

The construction management services will be at the Yigo reservoirs site along Route 1 near the entrance to Anderson Air Force Base and the Astumbo reservoir is located off Ysengsong Road on Chalan Paluan.

How much will it cost?

GWA and the construction management firm has negotiated the cost of One Hundred Twenty-Three Thousand One Hundred Ninety Dollars (\$123,190.00) to extend the services to August 16, 2019 for both sites. The cost is on a time and material basis. If the project finishes before the August 16, 2019 deadline, any unused portions will result in a deductive change order.

When will it be completed?

The construction management services will continue up until August 16, 2019. Should the contractor delay the project past the projected August 16, 2019 deadline, GWA will negotiate to extend the construction management contract. Cost will be covered by the contractor.

What is the funding source?

The funding for this project will be from the bond funds under the line item - PW 09-11 "Water System Reservoirs 2005 Improvements" and PW 12-05 "Tank Major Repair Yigo #1, Mangilao #2, Astumbo #1".

The funding sources will be replenished by money received from the contractor through a deductive change order from the contractor's contract.

This Memorandum of Understanding ("MOU") supplements the Contract between the Guam Waterworks Authority ("GWA") and Pernix Guam LLC ("Contractor") and will be attached to a Modification to that Contract. This MOU is to extend the MOU dated March 16, 2018 agreed upon and signed by all parties. This MOU details the extension of responsibilities for costs as agreed by the GWA and Contractor.

 Time Extension – The Substantial Completion date of October 15, 2018 and Final Completion date of November 21, 2018 for the Astumbo Reservoir, Yigo No. 1 Reservoir and Yigo No. 2 Reservoir extended by the MOU dated March 16, 2018 have expired.

Contract change requests may be considered to the extent allowed by the Contract Documents provided they are considered reasonable and justified in the opinion of GWA.

 Costs – Costs for Construction Management services at the Astumbo and Yigo sites shall be borne by the Contractor from November 21, 2018 until Final Completion is achieved as defined by GWA.

The additional Construction Management services shall be invoiced to GWA by GHD directly, on a time and material basis, and are estimated to be in the total amount of \$3,500 to \$4,500 per week per site for the Astumbo and Yigo sites. GWA and Contractor agree that the total Construction Management costs shall not exceed \$9,500 per week per site, or \$19,000 per week for both sites. On a monthly basis, GWA shall provide a copy of the GHD invoice to Contractor and GWA may deduct the applicable portion of the CM's invoice amount as a deductive change order under the Contract with Pernix.

Further delays in the Final Completion of the project will be considered eligible for liquidated damages at \$4,500 per day per reservoir per site at the discretion of GWA.

In the event that GWA is assessed fines for not complying with the November 11, 2011 Order for Preliminary Relief of the Federal District Court of Guam in Civil Case No. 02-00035 with respect to completion of the Astumbo and Yigo No. 1 and No. 2 reservoirs, Contractor shall reimburse GWA for the full amount of such fines.

Except as revised by this MOU and related Change Order No. 10 and future related Change Order(s), all other terms and conditions of the Contract as revised by Change Orders No. 1, through 9, including the provisions for inclement weather in Paragraph 1.10 of Section 01311, shall continue to apply.

GHD is pleased to submit this proposal for an amendment to our Scope of Work and Fee for the above referenced project. This scope of work defines the construction management services that will be provided by GHD Inc. and their subconsultants for additional CM services due to construction delays of Astumbo and Yigo No. 1 and 2 Reservoirs. The additional scope for **CP-06** as discussed with GWA is detailed below. The additional scope will be charged on a time and material (T&M) basis per the fees in the table below.

SCOPE OF WORK

General: GHD shall provide additional Construction Management (CM) Services for the four and a half (4.5) month period of April 1, 2019 through August 16, 2019. This is expected to cover services for substantial completion to final completion and closeout services of the Yigo No. 1 and 2 Reservoirs. This is based on expected schedule as stated by the Contractor for the delivery and completion of punch list items. This CP is in conjunction with a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) dated March 16, 2018 and MOU dated February 28, 2019, both signed by GHD, Pernix and GWA. The extended October 15, 2018 substantial completion date and November 21, 2018 final completion date as agreed upon in the MOU dated March 16, 2018 has expired. From then to the March invoice, the CM services have been deducted from the budget allotted in Change Order #4.

The extended CM services included in this Change Proposal will be billed on a Time and Material basis. GHD's invoices will be paid by GWA directly, and the same amount will be deducted from Pernix's contract as agreed upon in the before mentioned MOUs.

Details: The Scope of Work will provide an extension of the construction phase tasks detailed in our original Scope of Work that relate to the construction of Astumbo and Yigo No. 1 and 2 Reservoirs. No

additional QA testing and survey service are included as they were covered in the original Scope of Work and Change Order No. 2.

Data and Assumptions:

- a. These CM Services are being provided for the construction of improvements shown on the construction plans and included in the bid schedule that was awarded to Pernix at the Astumbo and Yigo No. 1 and 2 Reservoir sites. If additional improvements are added to the construction contract then fees for additional CM Services will be negotiated with GWA.
- b. For the Yigo and Astumbo Reservoirs, it is understood that the intent is for GHD to provide four and a half (4.5) consecutive months (20 weeks) of part-time, as-needed Resident Engineer (RE)/Project Manager (PM) services and four and a half (4.5) consecutive months of part- time onsite inspection averaging three (3) days per week. RE/PM services have been estimated at 8 hours per week and onsite inspector at 24 hours per week up to a maximum of \$5,000 per week. This is based upon a standard 40 hour work week.
- c. GWA agrees to negotiate with GHD for change orders for additional construction phase services for final completion beyond August 16, 2019 at either site due to construction delays, adverse weather delays, or any other reason not due to the negligent acts of GHD until final acceptance of the project is achieved.

Issues for Decision

Resolution No. 30-FY2019

Relative to Approval of Change Oder No. 4 for the Central Guam Reservoirs Design Project

What is the projects objective and is it necessary and urgent?

The objective of the change order is to authorize additional design services that are necessary for GWA to improve water distribution system functionality and reliability for service areas associated with the Hyundai, Pulantat/Manenggon, Chaot No. 2, Tamuning No. 1 (Airport), Tumon No. 1 (Nissan), and Piti reservoir. The following are part of this proposed change order:

- 1. Task A: Design changes to install a new pump controller unit at the new Hyundai Tank Booster Pump Station.
- 2. Task B: Design changes to the Chaot No. 1, Chaot No. 2, and Agana Heights Reservoirs SCADA.
- 3. Task C: Programming of the Chaot No. 1, Chaot No. 2, and Agana Heights Reservoirs SCADA.
- 4. Task D: Programming of the Manenggon, Tamuning No. 1 (Airport), and Piti Reservoirs SCADA.
- 5. Task E: Tamuning No. 1 (Airport) Reservoir Tiyan Booster Pump Station, Sewer Line Rehabilitation, and Water Line Abandonment.
- 6. Task F: A-23 and A-25 (Serves Chaot and Agana Heights Reservoir) GAC System Additional Design.
- 7. Task G: Manenggon Reservoir Access Pump Station Additional Design.
- 8. Task H: Additional Structural Design to Increase Tamuning No. 1 Reservoir (Airport) from 2 Million Gallon Capacity to 3 Million Gallon Capacity.

GWA finds that it is in the best interest of the agency that the current engineering consultant conducts the additional work so as to expedite the design package preparation and provide cost savings given the design consultant is already are aware of the system improvement needs.

How much will it cost?

The cost for the additional design services is \$200,458.00.

When will it be completed?

If the Change Order is approved, the design schedule will have the final tank design tasks completed by December 2019; however, the date may be adjusted if new issues arise.

What is the funding source?

The source of funding will be from CIP line item PW 09-11 Water System Reservoirs 2005 Improvements and EE 09-09 SCADA Improvement – Phase 4.

WHEREAS, following CCU approval in Resolution No. 21-FY2015, GWA contracted with GHD in the amount of Two Million Five Hundred Fifty-Two Thousand Four Hundred Forty-Five Dollars (\$2,552,445.00) in May 2015 to provide design services for the Central Guam Reservoirs; and

WHEREAS, GWA subsequently issued Change Order No. 1 and Change Order No. 2 with GHD for additional design services in the amount of Two Hundred Fifty-Five Thousand Two Hundred and Forty-Four Dollars (\$255,244.00);

GHD is pleased to submit this change proposal to amend our Scope of Work and Fee for the above referenced project. This scope of work defines the additional design services GHD will provide in connection with the Design Services for GWA's Central Water Reservoirs Project. Deliverables of the tasks will be amendments to the Tumon 2, Hyundai and Chaot 2 Reservoirs construction project. The additional scope for CP-10 is detailed below. The original project scope will be amended on a lump sum basis per the fees in the table below.

SCOPE OF WORK

Task A – Design Changes for Grundfos Controller at Hyundai Pump Station: GWA requested GHD make design adjustments to the pump controller at the new Hyundai Pump Station to add a package triplex Grundfos controller for the pumps. The current design provides for the pumps to be controlled by the SCADAPak. GWA is requesting the addition of the Grunfos controller to keep consistency between GWA facilities. GWA and the Contractor have requested only a change to the P&ID on sheet J-002 which will be issued as an addendum to the construction drawings that are currently under construction by AIC. No additional Division 1 specifications or front-end documents are included in this scope.

Task B – Design Changes to Chaot and Agana Heights SCADA: See attached SOW from ArcSine dated April 4, 2019.

Task C – Programming of Chaot and Agana Heights SCADA: See attached, revised SOW from ArcSine dated May 8, 2019. The scope of work includes programming for all of the Central Reservoirs project, but only the costs for programming at Agana Heights Reservoir and Chaot Reservoirs are

included in this Change Proposal because they were not included in the SOW for Change Order 3. The remaining of the cost of \$85,000 for the programming at the other sites will be divided by three and covered by GHD, remaining funds from the Water Hydraulic Modeling Data Collection - Barrigada Service Area project, and excess funds from Change Order No. 2 Task P that were not used.

Task D – Programming of Manenggon, Tamuning No. 1, and Piti Reservoirs SCADA: See attached revised SOW from ArcSine dated May 8, 2019.

Task E – Tiyan Booster Pump Station, Sewer Line Repair and Waterline Abandonment: Change Order No. 2 included a task from Change Proposal 4 for the design of additional piping to connect the area west of the airport runways to GWA waterlines. The task assumed that properties along the cliff line would be purchased by DPW and disconnected from an existing GWA waterline. There was a delay in the purchase of these properties. In order to abandon a waterline under the runways and still serve these houses, GHD was requested to design a small booster pump station in Tiyan to boost the pressure. GWA also requested the replacement or repair of the sewer line through GIAA property west of the runways. The work for this task has already been completed.

Task F – Wells A-23 and A-25 GAC System Additional Design: The scope for approved Task A of Change Proposal 9 included piping design for the installation of an existing GAC system at Well A-23 that would treat water from A-23 and A-25. A concrete slab for the relocated tanks was part of the scope. The fee for Task A of Change Proposal 9 was covered by unused fee for the Pulantat Reservoir site. The design has expanded to include sizing of the GAC system, investigation of treatment options, option figures for locations for the GAC tanks, additional piping design, and design of new GAC systems at both sites. The additional work is the scope for this task and has already begun.

Task G – Access Pump Station Additional Design: Amendment 1 provided scope to refurbish the Access Water Booster Pump Station. The fees for the scope were covered by a contingency in the original contract. The scope of Amendment 1 included new pumps, piping, pump system evaluation, possible replacement of electrical, instrumentation, and control equipment. Architectural improvements and replacement of the generator and fuel storage were also part of the scope. GWA requested additional improvements during the design including a roof hatch above the pumps, converting an office to an electrical room, and changing the piping to stainless steel. The scope for this task consists of structural design for the roof hatch, electrical design to move the electrical and controls to the new electrical room, piping design to change to stainless steel pipe, and fuel changes to move the tank to the exterior of the building. The work for this task has already begun and is almost completed.

Task H – Additional Structural Design for 3 MG Reservoir at Tumon (Tamuning) No. 1: The original scope for the Tumon No. 1 site was for the design of a 2.0 MG reservoir. GWA has requested we upsize the reservoir to 3.0 MG. The structural design for the larger reservoir requires more effort and is included in this task. The cost for this task will be deducted from the design budget meant for the relocation of the Tumon No. 1 Reservoir included in Task P of Change Order No. 3.



ASSUMPTIONS AND EXCEPTIONS

• This change proposal only applies to the scope of work. The terms of the original executed agreement still apply.




TASK 4 - TESTING AND STARTUP

4.1 Startup Testing Summary

• Develop an overview suitable for distribution to the Contractor's organization and GWA, of startup and testing responsibilities. Reference specification sections. Include also the roles of GWA's programmer (ArcSine), and expected coordination.

4.2 Unwitnessed Factory Testing at ArcSine's Facility:

• Perform in-house unwitnessed factory testing on the RTU's and displays programmed under this Scope of Work.



• Submit RTU code to CPC for downloading to each site's RTU, for the Central Reservoir's sites.

4.3 Witnessed Factory Testing at Panel Fabricator's Facility (Central Reservoir's sites):

- The Contractor's panel fabricator has responsibility for panel physical construction, including hardwired relay logic. Testing of those functions is under the Contractor's jurisdiction. For programmed functions, under this Scope develop test procedures for factory and field testing.
- Attend witnessed factory testing at the panel fabricator's facility in Seattle, Washington. Allow one person, 5 man-days.
- In the event that project schedule, including panel fabrication and shipping schedules, do not correlate well with program development schedules, factory testing of the automation functions will comprise "best efforts," with ArcSine testing whatever remains unwitnessed at ArcSine's facility.

4.4 Preliminary Electrical Field Tests (Operational Readiness Test, ORT)

• Provide test checklists for the specified Preliminary Electrical Field Tests. The goal will be to have the Contractor conduct the tests, witnessed by the CM and/or GWA, without the programmer present. Tests covered by the programmer's procedure will largely be comprised of end-to-end signal tests, where signal existence is confirmed at the local displays (and at central SCADA, if so available).

4.5 Final Control System Field Tests (Functional Acceptance Tests, FAT):

For the Central Reservoir's sites, assume 1 day each for reservoir and PRV sites, 2 days each for booster pumping stations. - For the additional sites, allow an additional week on-Island, under a separate schedule, to start up and test these sites.
- The automation portion of the test procedures will be developed by ArcSine, as an adaptation of the factory test procedures. The hardwired portion will be by the Contractor. Using these procedures, execute complete testing of the hardwired and programmed logic. Prove out local stand-alone functionality.
- In the event that site commissioning and final testing do not fall on a consecutive 2-week period (Central Reservoirs) or the 1-week followup period (other), the procedures will be developed such that a preliminary first run can be work by the Contractor on his schedule with witnessing by the CM/GWA. Then ArcSine's on-Island work will comprise a revisit by the CM/GWA to verify final testing completion and close out loose ends.
- In cooperation with GPA and its Central SCADA consultant, these procedures will also test functions and data transmissions end-to-end, to the extent practical.

4.6 In conjunction with the FAT's, provide the following on-Island services:



Item 4.6 is not included.

- Provide training of GWA personnel on site-specific functions. PLC training to include description of PLC parameters and how values are determined. Training will be optimized within the available timeframe.
- During this time, coordinate/facilitate the activities above, assisting the parties in achieving the end-to-end functionality desired.
- Handmark Contractor control-related shop drawings for as-built conditions, as observed by ArcSine in the course of the work. The on-Island time will make best use of ArcSine's staff including as-builting these details to the extent possible.
- Mark up control strategies.
- Perform file management, and provide version-controlled final programs for structured storage within the central server environment. Coordinate with GPA, GWA, and GPWA IT.
- Provide a log of setpoints as-installed.
- Submit electronic copy and one hardcopy of the RTU program.
- Allow 2 days, contiguous with the FAT allowance, for the items above.

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TECHNICAL SPECIFICATIONS ON ITEM 1.0

A. <u>GENERAL</u>: The Guam Waterworks Authority ("GWA") uses liquid chlorine in 150 lbs. and One (1) Ton. Cylinders in order to disinfect drinking water at approximately 100 well sites and one (1) water treatment plant. GWA intends to enter into a three (3) year contract with the option to renew for two (2) additional one-year terms for the purchase of liquid chlorine in 150-pound cylinders. All extensions of the contract are subject to the availability of funding. Price modifications for the extensions may be made if the contractor provides proof of changes in their invoice price as required under 2 G.A.R. Section 3118. This specification describes the requirements for the provision of liquid chlorine under this solicitation.

The product described herein shall be manufactured, packaged, shipped, and stored in accordance with the latest additions of the following codes and standards as well as any applicable referenced standards within.

- 1. AWWA B301-04: Standard for Liquid Chlorine.
- 2. ANSI/NSF Standard 60: Drinking Water Chemicals.
- 3. Chlorine Institute, Pamphlet 17: Cylinder and Ton Container Procedures for Chlorine Packaging.
- 4. Compressed Gas Association, Pamphlet C6: Standards for Visual Inspection of Steel Compressed Gas Cylinders.
- 5. US Department of Transportation, Hazardous Materials Regulations 49 C.F.R. § 100-177 (Chapter 1, Subchapter C).
- **B.** <u>MATERIAL SPECIFICATION</u>: Liquid Chlorine for disinfection of potable water supplies must meet the requirements of AWWA Standard B-301-04, Section 4.

The supplier under this contract shall be responsible for providing certified analysis from the manufacturer demonstrating compliance with the requirements set forth in this bid.

CONTAINERS: The supplier shall be responsible for providing, inspecting, testing and cleaning of cylinders in accordance with all referenced standards.

- 1. GWA currently has an inventory of 280 each 150 lbs. and 12 each One Ton GWA-owned cylinders that are currently being used by GWA. These cylinders shall be used by the successful bidder upon exchange on an empty 150 lbs.' or 1-ton cylinder. GWA shall have the right to certify whether or not said cylinders are in good useable condition.
- Cylinders shall be inspected, tested, and cleaned in accordance with AWWA Standard B301-04, Section 5. The supplier must maintain at all times documentation of compliance with these requirements at the supplier's facility.
- 3. GWA reserves the right to reject any cylinders that do not meet the chemical, physical, or safety requirements of this specification. In the event that a cylinder is rejected, the supplier shall replace it with a like amount of satisfactory liquid chlorine in an acceptable container.
- 4. No cylinder deposit or cleaning charge shall be separately levied. All fees for the maintenance of 150 lb and One Ton. cylinders in accordance with applicable codes shall be included in the unit cylinder price.

C. STORAGE AND MINIMUM INVENTORY REQUIREMENTS:

Due to the potential for interruption of shipping networks to Guam due to typhoons and other causes, it is necessary to maintain a minimum inventory (backup reserve) of chlorine in order to insure availability at all times. The minimum backup reserve has been established for GWA by the USEPA as noted below.

- 1. The supplier shall maintain a sufficient inventory of 150 pound and one-ton chlorine cylinders such that a backup reserve of at least 200 150 lbs. cylinders and three (3) one ton shall be available at any and all times. This reserve shall be exclusive of any reserve required by other customers.
- 2. The supplier shall provide an inventory plan (along with bid), based on the quantities described above, illustrating compliance with these backup reserve provisions.
- 3. The supplier shall responsible for maintaining a storage facility in compliance with OSHA and other applicable law, codes and standards regarding the receiving, handling, storage, delivery, and emergency response to chlorine gas. The supplier shall maintain documentation of compliance to be provided at the request of GWA.
- 4. No additional facility maintenance or storage charges (or any other charge) shall be separately levied. All fees for shipping, storage and facility maintenance shall be included in the unit cylinder price.

D. SPECIAL CONDITIONS:

- 1. The contract for the supply of liquid chlorine shall be for a period of three (3) years. GWA reserves the right to renew this contract for two (2) additional one-year terms with both parties so agree in writing. All extensions of the contract are subject to the availability of funding. Price modifications for the extensions may be made if the contractor provides proof of changes in their invoice price as provided under 2 G.A.R. Section 3118.
- 2. Cost data pursuant to 2 G.A.R. § 3118 to support any proposed increase must be submitted to the Purchasing Director no less than 90 days prior to the effective date of any such requested price increase. Any adjustment allowed shall consist of verifiable material cost increases which may be passed on to the consumer.
- 3. No adjustment shall be made to compensate a supplier for inefficiency in operation, or for additional profit.
- 4. Bids indicating price in effect at time of shipment will be considered invalid.
- 5. Bidder shall respond to a GWA facility should an emergency situation develop, with the appropriate tools necessary to deal with a leak; said **response** shall be no longer than two hours from the time of notification. Emergency numbers for this procedure shall accompany the bid.
- 6. If the products proposed in the response to this bid vary in any way from the requirements contained in this specification or other solicitation documents, the bidder is responsible to clearly identify by specification section number, all such differences in writing at the time of bid. Otherwise, it will be assumed that bidder's offer is in total compliance with all aspects of the specification and bid.

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II. GENERAL TERMS AND CONDITIONS

A. AUTHORITY.

This Invitation for Bids is issued subject to all of the provisions of the Guam Procurement Act and the Guam Procurement Regulations. The bid requires all parties involved in the preparation, negotiation, performance, or administration of contracts to act in good faith. Failure on the part of any bidder to act in good faith shall serve as a basis for voiding a bid or shall constitute a material breach of any contract entered into between GWA and any bidder which shall allow GWA to immediately terminate the contract.

B. EXPLANATION TO BIDDERS.

Except as otherwise provided herein, no oral explanation in regard to the meaning of any provision of this Bid will be made and no oral instructions will be given before the award of the bid. Discrepancies, omissions, or doubts as to the meaning of any provision of this Bid shall be communicated in writing to the named individual of GWA.

C. **QUESTIONS.**

<u>All</u> questions regarding the bid must be submitted in writing and be delivered, via US mail, via express delivery, e-mail or via fax and directed to the following:

D. METHOD OF AWARD.

GWA intends to review the bids immediately upon the opening of the bids as provided herein. The bids submitted will be the primary documents for evaluation. GWA reserves the right to waive any minor information or irregularity in bids received. GWA shall have the prerogative to award, amend or reject bids in whole or in part. GWA is not responsible for any and all costs incurred by any person or party incurred in preparing any bid. GWA reserves the right to retain all bids submitted regardless of whether a firm is selected. Submission of a bid indicates acceptance of all terms and conditions by the bidder.

E. <u>REJECTION.</u>

GWA has the right to reject all bids or offers which have been submitted in response to this Bid, at any time, including after delivery if goods are determined to be non-conforming, if GWA

determines such to be in the best interest of GWA. All bids and contractual obligations are subject to the availability of funding.

F. TAXES.

Bidders are cautioned that they may be subject to Guam Business Privilege Taxes, including Gross Receipt Tax and Guam Income Taxes on Guam transactions. GWA shall not be responsible for paying any taxes owed by any vendor. Specific information of taxes may be obtained from the Director of the Guam Department of Revenue and Taxation.

G. LICENSING.

Bidders are cautioned that GWA will not consider for award any bid offer submitted by a bidder who has not complied with Guam Licensing Laws. Specific information on licenses may be obtained from the Director of Revenue and Taxation.

H. COVENANT AGAINST CONTINGENT FEES.

The bidder warrants that it has not employed any person to solicit or secure any resultant contract upon agreement for a commission, percentage, brokerage or contingent fee. Breach of this warranty shall give GWA the right to terminate the contract, or in its discretion, deduct from the contract price or consideration the amount of such commission, percentage, brokerage, or contingent fees. This warranty shall not apply to commissions payable by the bidder upon contracts or sales secure or made through bona fide established commercial or selling agencies maintained by the bidder for the purpose of securing business.

I. JUSTIFICATION OF DELAY.

The bidder who is awarded the bid guarantees that performance will be completed within the agreed upon completion date. If, however, the selected bidder cannot comply with the completion requirement, it is the selected bidder's responsibility to advise GWA in writing explaining the cause and reasons of the delay.

J. DISCLOSURE OF MAJOR SHAREHOLDERS.

As a condition of bidder, any partnership, sole proprietorship or corporation doing business with GWA shall submit an affidavit executed under oath that list the name address of any person who has held more than ten percent (10%) of the outstanding interest or shares in said partnership, sole proprietorship or corporation at any time during the twelve (12) month period immediately preceding submission of a bid. The affidavit shall contain the number of shares or the percentage of all assets of such partnership, sole proprietorship or corporation, which have held by each such person during the twelve (12) month period. In addition, the affidavit shall contain the name and address of any person who has received or is entitle to receive a commission, gratuity or other compensation for procuring or assisting in obtaining business related to the bid for the bidder and shall also contain the amounts of any such commission, gratuity or other compensation. A bid from any firm that has person on the list 10% or more affidavit that is a member of the CCU or a GWA

or Guam Power Authority officer that reports directly to the Board will not be evaluated and will be rejected. The affidavit shall be open and available to the public inspection and copying.

K. EQUAL EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITY.

Section 3.01(1) of Presidential Executive Order No. 10935 dated March 7, 1965, that was adopted on Guam, requires that the bidder not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, creed, color or national origin. The bidder will take whatever steps are necessary to ensure that its employees are treated equally during employment without regard to their race, creed, color or national origin.

L. DETERMINATION OF RESPONSIBILITY OF OFFERORS.

GWA reserves the right to secure information necessary to assess the competency and qualifications of the bidder, in accordance with the "Standard for Determination of the most Qualified bidder" section of the General Terms and Conditions. The competency of bidders, includes, but is not limited to testing of goods and/or services provided by the bidder.

M. STANDARD FOR DETERMING WHETHER BIDDER IS QUALIFIED.

In determining whether a bidder is qualified, GWA shall be guided by the following:

- 1. the ability, capacity, and skill of the bidder to perform (i.e., is bidder qualified);
- 2. whether GWA believes that the bidder can perform promptly or within the specified time;
- 3. the character, integrity, reputation, judgment experience, and efficiency of the bidder;
- 4. the sufficiency of the financial resources and ability of the bidder to perform;
- 5. whether the bidder has submitted all documents required under this Bid; and
- 6. whether the bidder can meet the terms and conditions of the Bid.

N. PRE-BID CONFERENCES.

Pre-bid conferences may be held at any time prior to the date established herein for submission of bids to explain the procurement requirements for this Bid. GWA will notify all bidders of any substantive clarification provided in response to any inquiry. GWA may extend the due date if such information significantly amends the solicitation or makes compliance with the original proposed due date impractical.

O. <u>BIDS.</u>

The Bidder is required to read each and every page of the bid and by the act of submitting a bid shall be deemed to have accepted all conditions contained therein except as noted elsewhere in the bid. In no case will failure to inspect constitute grounds for a claim or for the withdrawal of a bid after opening. Bids shall be filled out in ink or typewritten and signed in ink. Erasures or other changes in a bid must be explained or noted over the signature of the bidder. Bids containing any conditions, omissions, unexplained erasures or alterations or items not called for in the bid or irregularities of any kind may be rejected by GWA in whole or in part.

P. COMPETENCY OF BIDDERS.

Bids will be considered only from such bidders who, in the sole opinion of GWA, can show evidence of their ability, experience, equipment, and facilities to render satisfactory performance of the terms and conditions herein (see item "N" above for standards). GWA reserves the right to take all reasonable steps to determine the competency of bidders, including asking questions, testing or any other act deemed prudent by GWA based on the circumstances.

Q. <u>REQUEST FOR BID FORMS.</u>

Each bidder shall be provided with one (1) set of the Bid packet at a cost of \$15.00. If the bidder wishes to download a bid packet on GWA website <u>www.guamwaterworks.org</u>, the fee will not be charged and be automatically registered with GWA procurement office. All payments shall be by cash, certified check, credit card or money order and shall be made payable to GWA. R. BID ENVELOPE.

Bid envelopes shall be sealed and marked with the bidder's name and GWA's Invitation for Bid Number.

S. FORM OF BID.

One (1) original hard copy, two (2) complete hard copies and one (1) electronic copy of the bid <u>must</u> be submitted. The original bid must be signed in ink by a person authorized to submit bids on behalf of the bidder. All bids shall be submitted entirely in English (including brochures).

The electronic copy of the bid shall be submitted on a compact disk ("CD"). All documents shall be in ".pdf" format. Electronic bids shall constitute an exact replica of the original hard copy of the bid that is being submitted.

Bidders may declare portions of their bid as being confidential. Material so designated shall accompany the bid and shall be readily separable from the bid in order to facilitate public inspection of the non-confidential portion of the bid. However, prices and makes and models or catalogue numbers of the items offered, deliveries, and terms of payment shall be publicly available at the time of bid opening regardless of any designation to the contrary. GWA may review the material declared to be confidential to determine the validity of any requests for nondisclosure of trade secrets and other proprietary data identified in writing. If the parties do not agree as to the disclosure of data, GWA shall inform the bidders in writing what portions of the bids will be disclosed. All bids shall be opened to public inspections subject to any continuing prohibition on the **confidential** data.

T. MODIFICATION / ALTERATION.

After the opening of bids, GWA or its designee(s) may conduct discussions with bidders that have submitted valid bids for the purpose of clarification to provide GWA with a full understanding as to the responsiveness and capabilities of the proposed bidder in meeting the requirements of the bid. In conducting discussions there shall be complete confidentiality of any information derived from bids submitted by competing bidders.

U. MODIFICATION OR WITHDRAWAL OF BIDS.

Bids may be modified or withdrawn at any time prior to submission, as otherwise provided herein or by the Guam Procurement Code.

V. CONTACT FOR CONTRACT NEGOTIATION.

All vendors are required to designate a person whom GWA may contact for prompt negotiation.

W. AWARD OF CONTRACT AND NEGOTIATION (IF APPLICABLE).

The lowest **responsible** bidder may be required to enter into a contract with GWA on terms and conditions acceptable to GWA. If the services are to be secured via Purchase Order, the bidder must still comply with all applicable laws, bid requirements and directives from GWA regardless of whether or formal "contract" has been issued.

The bidder who submits the lowest responsible bid for the required services or supplies may be required to enter into a contract within twenty (20) days following Bidder's receipt of the Notice of Award of Bid. Contract negotiations will be directed toward: (1) making certain that the bidder has a clear understanding of the scope of work, specifically, the essential requirements involved in providing the required services; and (2) determining that the bidder will make available the necessary personnel and facilities to perform the services within the required time. Bidders will be required to follow all laws applicable to this bid at all times and the Bidder is responsible for ascertaining what laws are applicable to this bid.

X. NOTICE OF AWARD.

Written notice of award will be public information and made a part of the procurement file.

Y. CERTIFICATION AGAINST THE EMPLOYMENT OF CONVICTED SEX

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OFFENDERS.

All vendors must complete and fill out a Certification Against the Employment of Convicted Sex Offenders (part of bid **packet** – if not present, make sure you ask for one).

Z. TERMINATION OF BID.

After opening, but prior to award, GWA may terminate the bid in whole, or in part if:

- 1. It is in the best interest of GWA to do so.
- 2. The goods or services being sought are no longer required.
- 3. Bid amounts exceed available funding.
- 4. No bidder is qualified.

III. SPECIAL TERMS AND CONDITIONS

Note, these special terms and conditions apply in the event that GWA uses a purchase order. However, in the event a formal contract is entered into, the terms of the Contract shall control in the event of a conflict between these terms and conditions and the contract.

A. GENERAL COMPLIANCE WITH LAWS.

The Bidder agrees that they shall comply with all Federal and territorial laws, rules, regulations and **ordinances** applicable to the work being performed hereunder. Bidder shall attach a copy of appropriate business license or an affidavit executed under penalty of perjury that indicates that Bidder is exempt under Guam law (must include legal citations proving exemption). Bidder agrees that they have and will continue to familiarize themselves with the requirements of all laws and rules applicable to this procurement. Failure on the part of the bidder to familiarize themselves with the law and rules shall not excuse Bidder in any way.

B. <u>All OR NONE BIDS</u>

If applicable to this bid, GWA is requesting all of the bid items to be bidded or none at all. GWA will not award on an itemize basis.

C. BIDDERS PRICE

GWA will consider not more than (2) (Basic and Alternate Bids) item prices and the bidder shall explain fully each price if supplies, materials, equipment, and/or specified services offered comply with specifications and the products origin. Where basic or alternate bid meets the minimum required specification, cost and other factors will be considered. Failure to explain the requirements will result in rejection of the bid.

D. ACCESS TO RECORDS AND OTHER REVIEW.

The bidder, including his subcontractors, if any, shall maintain copies of all books, documents, papers, accounting records and other evidence pertaining to costs incurred and to make such materials available at their respective offices at all reasonable times during the contract period and for three (3) years from the date of the final payment under the contract, for inspection by the Guam Waterworks Authority. All originals of any documents related to this Contract shall be provided to GWA as soon as possible, but not later than one day prior to the conclusion of this Agreement. Each subcontract entered into by Bidder pursuant to this agreement shall include a provision containing the conditions of this Section.

E. <u>OWNERSHIP OF DOCUMENTS.</u>

All briefs, memoranda and other incidental Bidder work or materials furnished hereunder shall be and remain the property of GWA including all publication rights and copyright interests and may be used by GWA without any additional cost to GWA.

F. <u>INDEMNITY.</u>

Bidder agrees to save and hold harmless the CCU, GWA, its officers, agents, representatives, successors and assigns and other governmental agencies from any and all suits or actions of every nature and kind, which may be brought for or on account of any injury, death, or damage to the extent arising or growing out of the negligent acts or omissions of the Bidder, Bidder's officers, agents (including subcontractors), servants or employees under this agreement.

G. CHANGES.

By written order, at any time, and without notice to bidder's surety, GWA may, subject to all appropriate adjustments, make changes within the general scope of work of this Contract in any one or more of the followings:

- 1. Drawings, designs or specifications, if the supplies or services to be furnished are to be specifically manufactured for GWA in accordance therewith;
- 2. Method of shipping or packing; or
- 3. Place of delivery.

If any such change order increases or decreases the bidder's cost of, or the time required for performance of any part of the work under this contract, whether or not changed by the order, an adjustment shall be made and the contract modified in writing accordingly. Any adjustment in contract price made pursuant to this clause shall be determined in accordance with the Price Adjustment Clause of this Contract.

Failure of the parties to agree to an adjustment shall not excuse the bidder from proceeding with the Contract as changed, provided that GWA promptly and duly make such provisional adjustments in payment or time for performance as may be reasonable. By proceeding with the work, the bidder shall not be deemed to have prejudiced any claim for additional compensation, or an extension of time for completion. Within 30 days after receipt of a written change order, unless such period is extended by GWA in writing, the Bidder shall file notice of intent to assert a claim for an adjustment. Later notification shall not bar the Bidder's claim unless GWA is prejudiced by the delay in notification. No claim by the Bidder for an adjustment hereunder shall be allowed if notice is not given prior to final payment given under this bid.

In the **absence** of such a change order, nothing in this clause shall be deemed to restrict the bidder's right to pursue a claim arising under the contract if pursued in accordance with the clause entitled "Claims Based on Acts or Omissions by GWA" of this Contract.

H. TERMINATION.

TERMINATION FOR DEFAULT:

(1). Default. If the Bidder refuses or fails to perform any of the provisions of this contract with such diligence as will ensure its completion within the time specified in this contract, or any extension thereof, otherwise fails to timely satisfy the contract provisions, or commits any other substantial breach of this contract as determined by GWA, then GWA may notify the Bidder in writing of the delay or non-performance and if not cured in ten days or any longer time specified in writing by GWA. GWA may terminate the Bidder's right to proceed with the contract or such part of the contract as to which there has been delay or a failure to properly perform. In the event of termination in whole or in part GWA may procure similar services in a manner and upon terms deemed appropriate by GWA. The Bidder shall continue performance of the contract to the extent it is not terminated and shall be liable for excess costs incurred in procuring similar services.

(2) Bidder's Duties. Notwithstanding termination of the contract and subject to any directions from GWA, the Bidder shall take timely, **reasonab**le, and necessary action to protect and preserve property in the possession of the Bidder in which GWA has an interest.

(3) Compensation. Payment for completed services delivered and accepted by GWA shall be at the contract price. Payment for the protection and preservation of property shall be in an amount agreed upon by the Bidder and GWA; if the parties fail to agree, GWA shall set an amount subject to the Bidder's rights under Chapter 9 (Legal and Contractual Remedies) of the Guam Procurement Regulations. GWA may withhold from amounts due the Bidder such sums as GWA deems to be necessary to protect GWA against loss because of outstanding liens or claims of former lien holders and to reimburse GWA for the excess costs incurred in procuring similar goods and services.

(4) Excuse for Nonperformance or Delayed Performance. Except with respect to defaults of sub-contractor(s) of Bidder, the Bidder shall not be in default by reason of any failure in performance of this contract in accordance with its terms (including any failure by the Bidder to make progress in the prosecution of the work hereunder which endangers such performance) if the Bidder has notified GWA within 15 days after the cause of the delay and the failure arises out of causes such as: acts of God; acts of the public enemy; acts of the government of Guam and any other governmental entity in its sovereign or contractual capacity; fires; floods; epidemics;

quarantine restrictions; strikes or other labor disputes; freight embargoes; or unusually severe weather. If the failure to perform or to make progress due to such causes similar to those set forth above, the Bidder shall not be deemed to be in default, unless the services to be furnished by the sub-contractor were reasonably obtainable from other sources in sufficient time to permit the Bidder to meet the contract requirements. Failure of the sub-contractor to perform for reasons other than cited above shall constitute a default of the Bidder unless cured by Bidder with a reasonable time. Upon request of the Bidder, GWA shall ascertain the facts and extent of such failure, and, if GWA determines that any failure to perform was occasioned by any one or more of the excusable causes, and that, but for the excusable cause, the Bidder's progress and performance would have met the terms of the contract, the delivery schedule shall be revised accordingly, subject to the rights of GWA and the government of Guam under the laws of Guam.

(5) Erroneous Termination for Default. If, after notice of termination of the Bidder's right to proceed under the provisions of this clause, it is determined for any reason that the Bidder was not in default under the provisions of this clause, or that the delay was excusable under the provisions of Paragraph (4) (Excuse for Nonperformance or Delayed Performance) of this clause, the rights and obligations of the parties shall be the same as if the notice of termination had been issued pursuant to Subsection C, below.

(6) Additional Rights and Remedies. The rights and remedies provided in this clause are in addition to any other rights and remedies provided by law or under this contract

TERMINATION FOR CONVENIENCE:

(1) <u>Termination</u>. GWA may, when the interest of GWA so requires, terminate this contract in whole or in part, for the convenience of GWA. GWA shall give written notice of the termination to the Bidder specifying the part of the contract terminated and when termination becomes effective.

(2) <u>Bidder's Obligations</u>. The Bidder shall incur no further obligations in connection with the terminated work and on the dated set in the notice of termination the Bidder will stop work to the extent specified. The Bidder shall also terminate outstanding orders and subcontracts as they relate to the terminated work. The Bidder shall settle the liabilities and claims arising out of the termination of subcontracts and orders connected with the terminated work. GWA may direct the Bidder to assign the Bidder's right, title, and interest under terminated orders or subcontracts to GWA. The Bidder must still complete the work not terminated by the notice of termination and may incur obligations as are necessary to do so.

(3) <u>Right to Work Product</u>. Upon termination of the contract for the convenience of GWA or for any other reason, Bidder shall transfer title and deliver to GWA all documents and reports, plans, drawings, information and other material produced by Bidder or any of its sub-contractors in connection with the performance of this contract. The Bidder shall protect and preserve property in its possession or in the possession of any of its sub-contractors in which GWA has an interest.

(4) <u>Compensation</u>.

- (a) The Bidder shall submit a termination claim specifying the amount due because of the termination for convenience together with cost or pricing data to the extent required by 2 G.A.R. § 3118 (Cost or Pricing Data) of the Guam Procurement Regulations bearing on such claim. If the Bidder fails to file a termination claim within one year from the effective date of termination, GWA may pay the Bidder, if at all, an amount set in accordance with Subparagraph (c) of this Paragraph.
- (b) GWA and the Bidder may agree to a settlement provided the Bidder has filed a termination claim supported by cost or pricing data to the extent required by 2 G.A.R. § 3118 (Cost or Pricing Data) of the Guam Procurement Regulations and that the settlement does not exceed the total contract price plus settlement costs reduced by payments previously made by GWA and the contract price of the work not terminated.
- (c) Absent complete agreement under Subparagraph 4(b) of this Section, GWA shall pay the Bidder the following amounts, provided payments that are agreed upon under Subparagraph 4(b) shall not duplicate payments under this Subparagraph:
 - (i) contract prices for services accepted under the contract;
 - (ii) costs incurred in preparing to perform and performing the terminated portion of the work plus a fair and reasonable profit on such portion of the work (such profit shall not include anticipatory profit or consequential damages) less amounts paid or to be paid for accepted supplies or services; provided, however, that if it appears that the Bidder would have sustained a loss if the entire contract would have been completed, no profit shall be allowed or included and the **amount** of compensation shall be reduced to reflect the anticipated rate of loss;
 - (iii) costs of settling and paying claims arising out of the termination of subcontracts or orders pursuant to Subparagraph (b) of this clause;
 - (iv) the reasonable settlement costs of the Bidder including accounting, clerical, and other expenses reasonably necessary for the preparation of settlement claims and supporting data with respect to the terminated portion of the contract for the termination and settlement of subcontracts hereunder, together with reasonable storage, transportation, and other costs incurred in connection with the protection or disposition of property allocable to the terminated portion of this contract. Attorney's fees if for any reason it files suit against the government must be paid by the Bidder. The total sum to be paid the Bidder under this Subparagraph shall not exceed the total contract price plus the reasonable settlement costs of the Bidder reduced by the amount of payments otherwise made, the proceeds of any sales of supplies and manufacturing materials under Subparagraph (b) of this Paragraph, and the contract price of work not terminated.
- (d) Cost claimed, agreed to, or established under Subparagraph (b) and (c) of this Paragraph shall be in accordance with Chapter 7 (Cost Principles) of the Guam **Procur**ement Regulations.

I. SEVERABLE PROVISIONS.

If any provision of this agreement shall be deemed by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, then such provision shall be deemed stricken from the agreement and the agreement shall be enforced according to its valid and subsisting terms and provisions. The terms of this Contract shall control in the event of any conflict between this Contract and any other document incorporated or referenced herein.

J. GOVERNING LAW AND VENUE.

The validity of any agreement entered into under this bid and any of its terms or provisions, as well as the rights and duties of the parties to this agreement, shall be governed by the laws of Guam. Moreover, any and all actions governing this agreement shall be brought in either the Guam Superior Court or the Guam District Court if applicable.

K. EFFECTIVE DATE OF AGREEMENT.

Any agreement under this Bid shall take effect upon the date said agreement is signed by the GWA General Manger (who shall sign last). Agreements under this provision includes Purchase Orders in the absence of a formal written contract.

L. GOVERNMENT NOT LIABLE.

1. GWA, its officers, agents, employees and governing board assumes no Liability for any accident or injury that may occur to the bidder, bidder's agents, employees, or to bidder's property while on the job or otherwise en route to or from the job **during** any travel required by the terms of this agreement.

2. GWA, its officers, agents, employees and governing board shall not be liable to bidder for any work performed by the bidder prior to the written and signed approval of this Contract by the General Manager for GWA and by submitting a bid, the bidder expressly waives any and all claims for service performed in expectation of this agreement prior to its signature of the General Manager.

M. ASSIGNMENT.

An assignment of any portion of the performance required under this Bid is not valid unless written approval is first obtained from GWA. Requests for approval of the right to assign any portion of the contract or obligation, if awarded, must be made in writing and submitted with the bid. No other requests for assignment will be accepted.

N. LIQUIDATED DAMAGES.

By submitting a bid, the Bidder agrees to commence work on the date to be specified in a written "Notice to Proceed" from GWA and to fully complete the project within the allotted time

thereafter. In the event that the Bidder fails to complete the work called for in the bid, fails to provide the goods or services in the allotted time, then Bidder shall pay to GWA $\frac{1}{4}$ of 1% of the total bid price per day as liquidated damages for the non-performance as specified by the Guam Code Annotated. The liquidated damages herein are not a penalty, but rather a reasonable estimate by GWA of the loss it would suffer as a result of non-performance.

O. CONTRACT DOCUMENTS.

It is hereby mutually agreed that the following list of instruments, plans, specifications and documents which are attached hereto, bound herewith or incorporated herein by reference shall constitute the Contract Documents, all of which are made a part hereof, and collectively evidence and constitute the Contract between the parties, hereto, and they are as fully a part of any Agreement resulting from this bid as if they were set out verbatim and in full therein, and are designated as follows:

- m. Addenda/Amendments
- n. Answers to Questions (if GWA determines they are applicable).

P. DISPUTES.

Except as otherwise specifically provided in this contract, all disputes concerning questions of fact arising under this bid shall be decided by the GWA General Manager whose decision shall be final and conclusive upon the parties thereto. In the meantime, the bidder shall diligently proceed with the work as directed. However, the final decision of the GWA General Manager is appealable to the Guam Public Auditor as provided under 5 G.C.A. § 5427(e).

Q. CONTRACT ISSUED UNDER THIS BID IS BINDING.

It is agreed that any contract under this bid and all the Covenants hereof shall insure to the benefit of and binding upon GWA and the bidder respectively and his parties, successors, assignees and legal representative. Neither GWA nor the Bidder shall have the right to assign, transfer or sublet his interests or obligations hereunder without written consent of the other party.

It is hereby mutually agreed by and between the parties hereto that no mechanic, contractor, subcontractor, material man or other person can or will contract for or in any other manner have or acquire any lien upon the binding or works covered by the contract, or the land upon which the same is situated.

R. BIDDER'S RESPONSIBILITIES.

The Bidder shall be responsible for the quality and workmanship of all services and materials furnished under this **contract**. The Bidder shall, without additional cost to GWA, correct or revise all errors or deficiencies in his/her products or work.

GWA's review, approval, acceptance of, and payment for goods, fee, or for services required under this contract, shall not be construed to operate as a waiver of any rights under this contract or of any cause of action arising out of the Bidder's failure of performance of this contract and the Bidder shall be and remain liable to the GWA for all costs of any kind which may be incurred by the GWA as a result of the Bidder's negligent or erroneous performance of any of the services performed under this Bid. GWA shall continue to remain liable for its own negligent acts and those of its employees and its failure to perform as provided under this agreement.

S. SCOPE OF AGREEMENT.

Any Agreement issued under this bid and signed by the GWA General Manager (formal contract or Purchase Order) supersedes any and all other Agreements, either oral or in writing, between the parties hereto with respect to retaining the services of Bidder by the GWA and contains all of the covenants and terms between the parties with respect to such this project. Each party to this Agreement acknowledges that no **representation**, inducements, promises or agreements, orally or otherwise, have been made by any party, or anyone acting on behalf of any party which are not embodied herein, and that no other agreement, statement, or promise not contained in this Agreement and addenda will be effective only if it is in writing signed by the party to be charged. For the purposes of this paragraph and of the entire agreement, the signature of the General Manager for the Guam Waterworks Authority (or his designee) is the only signature that will bind the GWA.

T. CHANGE ORDERS.

By written order, at any time, and without notice to Bidder's surety, GWA may, subject to all appropriate adjustments, make changes within the general scope of work of this Contract in any one or more of the followings:

- 1. Drawings, designs or specifications, if the supplies or services to be furnished are to be specifically manufactured for GWA in accordance therewith;
- 2. Method of shipping or packing; or
- 3. Place of delivery.

If any such change order increases or decreases the Bidder's cost of, or the time required for performance of any part of the work under this contract, whether or not changed by the order, an

adjustment shall be made and the contract modified in writing accordingly. Any adjustment in contract price made pursuant to this clause shall be determined in accordance with the Price Adjustment Clause of this Contract.

Failure of the parties to agree to an adjustment shall not excuse the Bidder from proceeding with the Contract as changed, provided that GWA promptly and duly make such provisional adjustments in payment or time for performance as may be reasonable. By proceeding with the work, the Bidder shall not be deemed to have prejudiced any claim for additional compensation, or an extension of time for completion.

Within 30 days after receipt of a written change order, unless such period is extended by GWA in writing, the Bidder shall file notice of intent to assert a claim for an adjustment. Later notification shall not bar the Bidder's claim unless GWA is prejudiced by the delay in notification. No claim by the Bidder for an adjustment hereunder shall be allowed if notice is not given prior to final payment under this Contract.

In the absence of such a change order, nothing in this clause shall be deemed to restrict the Bidder's right to pursue a claim arising under the contract if pursued in **accordance** with the clause entitled "Claims Based on Acts or Omissions by GWA" of this Contract.

U. STOP WORK ORDERS.

GWA may by written order to the Bidder, at any time, and without notice to any surety, require the Bidder to stop all or any part of the work called for in the Contract. This order shall be for a **specified** period not exceeding ninety (90) days after the order is received by the Bidder, unless the parties agree to any longer period. Upon **receipt** of the order, the Bidder shall comply with its terms and take all reasonable steps to minimize the occurrence of costs allocable to the work covered by the order during the period of work stoppage. Before the stop work order expires, or within any further period to which the parties have agreed, GWA shall either cancel the work order or terminate the work covered by the order as provided under the Termination for Default or Termination for Convenience Clauses contained in this contract.

If a stop work order issued under this clause is cancelled at any time during the period specified in the order, of the period of the order or any extension thereof expires, the Bidder shall have the right to resume work. An appropriate adjustment shall be made to the delivery schedule or Bidder only if: (a) the stop work order results in an increase in the time required for performance or the Bidder's cost; and (b) if the Bidder asserts a claim for such an adjustment within thirty (30) days after the end of the period of work stoppage; provided that, if GWA decides that the facts justify such action, any such claim asserted may be received and acted upon at any time prior to final payment under this Contract. If a stop work order is not cancelled and the work covered by the order is terminated for default or convenience, the reasonable costs resulting from the stop work order shall be allowed pursuant to the price adjustment clause of this Contract.

V. CLAIMS BASED ON ACTS OR OMISSIONS BY GWA.

If any action or omission on the part of GWA requiring performance changes within the scope of the contract constitutes the basis for a claim by the Bidder for additional compensation, damages.

or an extension of time for completion, the Bidder shall continue with performance of the contract in compliance with the directions or orders of GWA, but by so doing, the Bidder shall not be deemed to have prejudiced any claim for additional compensation, damages, or an extension of time for completion; provided:

(a) the Bidder shall have given written notice to GWA:

(i) prior to the commencement of the work involved, if at that time the Bidder knows of the occurrence of such action or omission;

(ii) within 30 days after the Bidder knows of the occurrence of such action or omission, if the Bidder did not have such knowledge prior to the commencement of the work; or

(iii) within such further time as may be allowed by the Procurement Officer in writing.

This notice shall state that the Bidder regards the act or omission as a reason which may entitle the Bidder to additional compensation, damages, or an extension of time. The Procurement Officer or designee of such officer, upon receipt of such notice, may rescind such action, remedy such omission, or take such other steps as may be deemed advisable in the discretion of the Procurement Officer or designee of such officer.

(b) the notice required by Subparagraph (a) of this Paragraph describes as clearly as practicable at the time the reasons why the Bidder believes that additional compensation, damages, or an extension of time may be remedies to which the Bidder is entitled; and

(c) the Bidder maintains and, upon request, makes available to the Procurement Officer within a reasonable time, detailed records to the extent practicable, of the claimed additional costs or basis for an extension of time in connection with such changes.

Nothing herein contained, however, shall excuse the Bidder from compliance with any rules of law precluding any GWA official or its Bidders from acting in collusion or bad faith in issuing or performing change orders which are clearly not within the scope of the contract.

Any adjustment in the contract price made pursuant to this clause shall be determined in accordance with the Price Adjustment Clause of this contract.

W. PRICE ADJUSTMENT CLAUSE.

Any adjustment in contract price pursuant to clauses in this contract shall be made in one or more of the following ways:

- (a) by agreement on a fixed price adjustment before commencement of the pertinent performance or as soon thereafter as practicable;
- (b) by unit prices specified in the contract or subsequently agreed upon;

(c) by the costs attributable to the event or situation covered by the clause, plus appropriate profit or fee, all as specified in the contract or subsequently agreed upon;

(d) in such other manner as the parties may mutually agree; or

(e) in the absence of an agreement between the parties, by a unilateral determination by the GWA General Manager of costs attributable to the event or situation covered by the clause, plus appropriate profit or fee, all as computed by the GWA General Manager in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles and applicable sections under Chapter 7 (Cost Principles) of the Guam Procurement Regulations and subject to the provisions under Title 5, Chapter 5 of the Guam Code Annotated (Legal and Contractual Remedies).

X. SERVICE DISABLED VETERAN PREFERENCE.

Please note that in the event a bid is submitted by a bona-fide service disabled veteran where the bidder is at least fifty-one percent (51%) owned by a service-disabled veteran and the price for the supply or service *does not* exceed one hundred five percent (105%) of the lowest price bidder, GWA is required under 5 G.C.A. § 5011 to award the bid to the service-disabled owned business. A service-disabled veteran business must meet all of the following qualifications under 5 G.C.A. § 5012:

- (a) the business concern is licensed to do business on Guam;
- (b) the business concern maintains its headquarters on Guam;
- (c) the business concern is *at least* fifty-one percent (51%) owned by a servicedisabled veteran(s) who served in the active U.S. military service, was discharged or released under honorable conditions and whose disability is service-connected as demonstrated by a DD214, and certified by an award letter from the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs;
- (d) the DD214 and Disability award letter from the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs are submitted to the procuring entity for every service or supply offered; and;
- (e) the service-disabled veteran(s) owner of the business concern has filed individual tax returns on Guam for a period of *at least* three (3) consecutive years

For any request for a price adjustment, the contractor shall submit cost or pricing data for any price adjustments subject to the provisions of 2 G.A.R. § 3118 of the Guam Procurement Regulations.

IV. ADDITIONAL SPECIAL TERMS AND CONDITIONS

This is an "Indefinite Quantity Bid" pursuant to the Guam Procurement Regulations. <u>The quantities</u> reflected in the bid are estimated requirements only and not guaranteed minimums. The amounts listed are GWA's best estimate of its average annual needs. Quantities may increase or decrease thru the duration of the contract and continued purchase is subject to the availability of funds. No commitment is made to vendors in terms of purchasing quantity.

- A. The purpose of this bid is to provide GWA with a sufficient quantity of 150 lbs. and oneton liquid chlorine cylinders and to provide GWA with a sufficient supply of liquid chlorine to allow GWA to safely operate its water system and to comply with the terms and conditions of the USEPA / GWA Stipulated Order for Preliminary Relief (as amended) entered into on June 5, 2003. In addition, these specifications have been written to describe minimum performance requirements of the items to be supplied.
- B. GWA reserves the right to conduct a reasonable test following delivery and prior to acceptance to confirm that the products (both the cylinders and the chlorine) meet the minimum specifications set forth herein or otherwise performs as required.
- C. These specifications have been written to describe the minimum requirements to be supplied by the vendor bidding. This bid is subject to Guam's Procurement Laws.

GWA hereby notifies vendors that a reasonable test may be conducted upon delivery of each shipment and prior to acceptance, which may include, but is not limited to testing the goods to be provided under this Bid for quality, manufacturing defects, other irregularities and for compliance with these specifications. GWA also reserves the right to have any goods provided hereunder tested by an independent firm to ensure quality and compliance with requirements set forth in this bid. GWA also reserves the right to have the manufacturing process inspected for all goods provided hereunder.

- D. The Guam Waterworks Authority reserves the right to accept and/or reject any and all bids, to waive any defects, irregularities, or specification discrepancies and to award the bid as deemed to be the best interest to GWA.
- E. As required under Guam law, GWA reserves the right to cancel this bid if it is in the best interest of GWA to do so.
- F. The successful bidder shall warrant that all goods and services to be provided herein are fit for the intended purpose stated in this Bid, are **manufactured** in the **United States** and meet the standards set forth in this Bid. The bidder shall also warrant all goods provided under this Bid to have a useful product shelf life of a period of not less than one year. However, if the manufacturer of such goods provides a shelf life warranty for any period of time **greater** than one year for any item, that same warranty period shall be extended to GWA.
- G. In addition, the successful bidder will handle all warranty issues arising out of this agreement and shall act as the warranty administrator for the duration of any warranty provided under this Bid. Thus, if the vendor is not the manufacturer of the products provided under this Bid, GWA will not be required by the bidder to contact any manufacturer directly unless the bidder is the manufacturer of all goods provided hereunder and the bidder shall designate a delivery point on Guam for goods to be delivered or bidder shall pay all freight and handling charges associated with the return of the goods to the manufacturer and all costs for replacement.

- H. The successful bidder may be required to enter into a written contract on terms and conditions acceptable to GWA (also please note that a Purchase Order is a contract).
- I. Bidders are advised that they are required to follow all laws, rules and regulations relating to the provision of goods and services. Ignorance of any law, rule or regulation by the bidder at any time during the bidding process or performance under the bid shall not relieve the vendor from the applicability thereof.
- J. All Bidders shall maintain \$1,000,000 liability insurance policy throughout the duration of the performance of any contract entered into. Bidders shall provide a copy of the insurance policy to GWA as a condition for entering into the contract with GWA. Bidders shall also provide GWA with proof the policy has been renewed and kept in force throughout the contract term.
- K. Prior to entering into any contract with GWA, any and all successful bidders shall provide GWA with a valid and up-to-date copy of their Guam Business License which provides proof that they are able to engage in the type of business required for this bid.
- L. Bidders are also advised to use and fill out all forms attached to this Bid, including but not limited to the Affidavit of Non-Collusion, Certification Regarding Hiring Convicted Sex Offenders, Bid Bond, and any other form required to complete their bid.
- M. Bidders are reminded that submission of a bid constitutes an acknowledgement that they have read and understood all bid terms and agree to be bound by such an that failure to read the bid shall not excuse performance or otherwise give rise to any claim by bidder, including mistake, neglect or for any other reason.

V. SPECIAL PROVISIONS

1. Bid and Performance Bond Requirements:

All bidders are required to submit bid security in the amount of **15%** of their total bid amount which must also indicate that the security is not only for a bid bond, <u>but also for performance under this Bid</u> as required by 5 G.C.A. 5312. Failure to submit a proper bid bond will cause the bid to be rejected. Bid amounts are based on the total cost for the total number of units specified.

As required by law, the bid security shall not be released upon award of the bid, but instead shall continue in full force and effect until after delivery of the supplies or services required by the contract awarded to the Bidder under the associated Invitation for Bid is completed to secure the faithful performance under this Bid (e.g., until warranty period has ended as any warranty is a service provided in conjunction with the delivery of goods).

THE BID/PERFORMANCE GUARANTEE MAY BE IN THE FORM OF:

a. Cashier's Check or Certified Check

- b. Letter of Credit
- c. Surety Bond Valid only if accompanied by:
 - i. Current Certificate of Authority;
 - ii. Power of Attorney issued by the Surety to the Resident General Agent;
 - iii. Power of Attorney issued by two (2) major officers of the Surety to whoever is signing on their behalf
- 2. Performance Bond: see Section 1 above.

3. Failure To Submit Required Documentation.

Failure by Bidder to submit the required information or data will be cause to declare the bidder as non-compliant with the bid. Any declaration of non-compliance shall be at the sole discretion of the General Manager of the Guam Waterworks Authority.

4. <u>Shipping and Cost:</u>

Total cost must include CIF delivery to GWA's Ugum Water Treatment Facility located in Talafofo, Guam. Deliveries shall be made via flatbed truck or other means acceptable to GWA. If necessary, a forklift must be provided during deliveries by the successful vendor to unload the truck and place the chemicals at places at the Ugum facility designated by GWA staff. The contractor shall contact GWA's Procurement Division at least 72 hours in advance of each delivery to determine whether or not a forklift will need to be provided

5. **Delivery and Payment**

- a. The vendor will be responsible for all cost and all risks associated with the provision of these goods until delivery is made and the items are formally accepted by GWA. Formal acceptance under this bid shall not be deemed to be the mere delivery of the goods. Acceptance will only occur after delivery and inspection / testing is performed by GWA. Delivery time is 30 days from the date on the Notice to Proceed. GWA reserves the right to reject non-conforming goods at any time prior to use after the goods have been delivered.
- b. All goods shall be delivered CIF to GWA's Ugum Water Treatment Facility.
- c. The initial shipment shall be delivered to GWA within thirty days after the Notice to Proceed has been provided to the vendor. A Material Safety Data Sheet (MSDS) must be provided with <u>each</u> delivery, regardless of amount. Aside from the initial delivery, all goods must be delivered within 5 businesses from the date the vendor is notified of the need for goods and the amount of goods required to be delivered.
- d. Vendors must maintain at least a three (3) month supply of goods they are responsible for supplying on Guam at all times. Goods shall be stored in a manner to ensure that typhoons or other natural disasters do not make them unavailable to GWA when needed

since weather and natural disasters are exactly why the three (3) month supply is being required given the fact that water is a **necessary** element to ensuring public health.

e. Please note that usage of the chemicals is **dependent** upon many factors, including time of year, weather, etc.

Payment for all goods delivered shall be net 30 following the date that an invoice for goods delivered to GWA has been provided to GWA and verified by GWA. Verification shall take no longer than 10 business days. Vendors may not bill GWA for the inventory stock required to be maintained hereunder.

6. Quality:

All items to be delivered under this bid shall be of high quality and be of U.S. manufacture and they shall at all times conform to the specifications set out under this bid.

GWA reserves the right to reject items based on failure to meet the standards set forth herein or based upon quality.

GWA reserves the right to request samples from each bidder to test independently. If bidders do not provide a sample for testing if such a request is made, the bidder may not be deemed to be a qualified bidder and as such their bid may be rejected.

7. Contract Term:

The lowest responsive and **responsible** bidder for the item above will enter into a **contract** on terms acceptable to GWA. Form contracts from vendors shall not be used. The contract term shall commence on the date of the vendor's acknowledged receipt of a formal Notice to Proceed from GWA. The initial term is for three (3) years for chemicals to be used by GWA to operate the Ugum Surface Water Treatment Facility in compliance with the Long Term 2 Enhanced Surface Water Treatment Rule of the Safe Drinking water Act during the operation of a membrane water treatment facility. GWA finds that a multi-year fixed price contract will ensure the best price in the long-term to hedge against fluctuating prices which tend to increase over time and to increases efficiency in operations by not having to proceed through the bid process annually. This contract may be extended out annually for a maximum period of two (2) years subject to the consent of both parties. In the third-year price adjustments may be made subject to the provision of verified cost and pricing data from the vendor.

- 8. These specifications have been written to describe minimum performance requirements to be supplied by the manufacturers bidding.
- **9.** The successful bidder shall furnish all necessary information and instructions for the proper operation / completion of all requirements in bid specifications.

10. GWA reserves the right to accept and/or reject any and all bids, to waive any defects, irregularities, or specification discrepancies and to award the bid in the best interest of Guam Waterworks Authority.

Such notice shall be personally served by mailing the same by registered mail or certified mail, postage

prepaid, in an envelope addressed to the Bidder at any place the principal maintains an office or conducts its business.

2. After the expiration of one (1) year following the date on which the last of the labor was performed or material was supplied by the party bringing suit.

3. Other than in a court of competent jurisdiction in and for the Territory of Guam.

Issues for Decision

Resolution No. 33-FY2019

Relative to Approval of the One (1) Year Extension of the Indefinite Quantity Contract with Badger Meter Inc. for the purchase of additional water meters of various sizes and accessories.

What is the projects objective and is it necessary and urgent?

The objective is to exercise the available one (1) year option period under the existing contract to authorize the purchase of additional water meters that are needed for meter replacements and to insure there is adequate stock available to meet the requirements of the 2011 Court Order and new service applications.

GWA management is seeking CCU approval to exercise the one (1) year extension of the indefinite quantity contract with Badger Meter Inc. and for additional purchases under that contract extension. Price adjustments allowable under the terms of the contract have been proposed by Badger Meter and have been found to be reasonable by management. The project is necessary to keep sufficient meters and accessories in stock for operational needs, and for the on-going meter replacement program.

Where is it at?

The meters will be used to replace old and/or install new meters throughout GWA's systems.

How much will it cost?

Additional meter purchases are estimated to cost up to One Million Five Hundred Fifty-Nine Thousand Eight Hundred Eighty-Three and Nineteen Cents (\$1,559,883.19) which brings the total authorized funding to Five Million Three Hundred Seventy Thousand Five Hundred Eighty-Eight Dollars and Twenty-Eight Cents (\$5,370,588.28) under IFB 2015-13. GWA Management is still negotiating with Badger Meter Inc. for cost adjustments related to meters management believes should be replaced under warranty, and as such, the additional costs estimated do not reflect anticipated credit adjustments.

When will it be completed?

The contract term is from February 23, 2019 through February 23, 2020.

What is the funding source?

The source of the funding for the purchase of additional water meters will come from Internally Funded Capital Improvement Projects and any other appropriate funds identified by finance.

RELATIVE TO APPROVAL OF THE ONE (1) YEAR EXTENSION OF THE INDEFINITE QUANTITY CONTRACT WITH BADGER METER INC FOR THE ADDITIONAL PURCHASE OF WATER METERS OF VARIOUS SIZES AND ACESSORIES.

WHEREAS, under 12 G.C.A. § 14105, the Consolidated Commission on Utilities ("CCU") has plenary authority over financial, contractual and policy matters relative to the Guam Waterworks Authority ("GWA"); and

WHEREAS, the Guam Waterworks Authority ("GWA") is a Guam Public Corporation established and existing under the laws of Guam; and

WHEREAS, in order to support fulfilling Court Order requirements for meter replacements and provide for maintaining an adequate inventory, GWA advertised an Invitation for Bid (IFB) 2015-13 soliciting proposals from experienced and responsive bidders to provide water meters to replenish Guam Waterworks Authority stock as needed for water meter change outs and new installations; and

WHEREAS, out of fifteen (15) bidders expressing interest, there were two (2) responsive and responsible bidders who offered water meters of various sizes and accessories meeting the requirements of IFB 2015-13; and

WHEREAS, the IFB 2015-13 offers were evaluated by GWA's review committee; and

WHEREAS, GWA's review committee reviewed the proposals for IFB 2015-13 and determined that the offer for "All or None Bid for water meters of various sizes and accessories" with an estimated amount of Four Hundred Twenty-Seven Thousand Five Hundred Forty Dollars and Two Cents (427,540.02) over a three (3) year contract term, made

by Badger Meter Inc. ("Badger") was fair and reasonable and recommended Badger Meter Inc.
 be awarded the contract (see Res. No. 24-FY2018 at Exhibit A); and

WHEREAS, GWA issued a Notice to Proceed to Badger Meter Inc. on February 23, 2016 at which time Badger Meter accepted the notice (see Res. No. 24-FY2018 at Exhibit B); and

WHEREAS, GWA submitted Resolution No. 32-FY2017 which sought approval of purchases up to One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000.00) for additional water meters and CCU approved it on May 23, 2017 (see Res. No. 24-FY2018 at Exhibit C); and

WHEREAS, GWA Management, in response to emergent functional issues with Badger's Model LP Meter, had initiated efforts to replace that model under warranty with a more robust and reliable model, and such efforts have outpaced the receipt of warranty replacement from the manufacturer; and

WHEREAS, GWA Management seeks to continue its increased efforts to replace the Model LP meters to mitigate impacts to, and improve revenues, and will need to purchase additional meters to achieve this goal; and

WHEREAS, during the course of the replacement program additional meters were found to have failed the testing procedure and it is GWA's position that those meters are still under warranty and will be either credited toward the supplier's future invoices or under a reimbursement program; and

WHEREAS, In Resolution 24-FY2018, GWA sought and received approval of the ratification for purchases in excess of the \$1M threshold related to IFB 2015-13 in the amount of Fourteen Thousand Two Hundred Twenty-Four Dollars and Thirty-Two Cents (\$14,224.32), plus One Million One Hundred Fifteen Thousand Seven Hundred Eighteen Dollars and Sixty-Five Cents (\$1,115,718.65) for the meter inventory replenishment, and One Million Four Hundred Forty-Nine Thousand Eight Hundred Fifty-Five Thousand for additional water meter supply, which brought the total authorized funding to Three Million Five Hundred Seventy-

Nine Thousand Seven Hundred Ninety-Seven Dollars and Ninety-Seven Cents (\$3,579,797.97) (Exhibit A); and

WHEREAS, GWA Management encumbered purchases under previously issued purchase orders totaling \$3.3M which leaves a remaining authorization of Two Hundred Thirty Thousand Nine Hundred Seven and Twelve Cents (\$230,907.12); and

WHEREAS, the three (3) year contract term with Badger expired on February 23, 2019 and on February 25, 2019 GWA and Badger mutually agreed to extend the contract for an additional year with amendments outlined in a letter from Badger to include a price increase of five (5%) percent, as per Section U, Price Adjustment Clause of the Agreement. (Exhibit B); and

WHEREAS, on April 10, 2019 GWA issued a Contract Renewal Notice to Badger Meter Inc. for the One (1) year contract extension of IFB 2015-13 for Water Meters Various Sizes and Accessories. (Exhibit C); and

WHEREAS, GWA seeks approval of additional funding under the one (1) year contract extension for IFB 2015-13 with Badger to purchase and additional Nine Thousand One (9001) water meters of various sizes and accessories in the amount of One Million Five Hundred Fifty-Nine Thousand Eight Hundred Eighty-Three and Nineteen Cents (\$1,559,883.19) which will cover the costs of both meter supply and replenishment inventory throughout the one (1) year term (Exhibit D); and

WHEREAS, GWA Management is still negotiating the terms of adjustments and/or credits for replacement meters for the failed LP meters which were replaced by GWA with M25 Models, and therefore the proposed additional amounts are estimated as a not-to-exceed value; and

WHEREAS, the source of the funding increase for the purchase of additional water meters will come from Internally Funded Capital Improvement Projects and any other appropriate funds identified by finance.






















4. PUC NEM Public Hearings:


7. Generation KPI's - April 2019






Historical Monthly Peak Demand April 2013 - April 2019


Peak Demand — 12-month Rolling Average — 2-year Rolling Average — 3-year Rolling Average



Historical KWH Sales May 2015 - April 2019




SYSTEM GROSS HEAT RATE (KWH/Gal) May 2015 - April 2019




Gross and Net Generation (KWH) May 2015 - April 2019

Fuel Cargo and Fuel Consumption Costs (\$/bbl) April 2015 - April 2019





Siemens was awarded the contract from the Request for Proposal No. GPA-RFP-16-013 issued in May 2016 for Partnering Opportunities for the Development of Demand-Side Energy Conservation Programs and Utility Energy Services Contract Programs. The Utility Energy Services Contract supports GPA's demand side management program in the implementation or execution of energy efficiency and renewable projects for our large customers which may include financing as well as technical support.

The tasks include energy efficiency projects at GDOE and potentially other schools on the island. The opportunity for the projects at Carbullido, George Washington and Southern schools will be during this summer while school is out of session. The majority of the contract cost, approximately 68%, is to be funded by grants.

Where is the location?

Most of the current contract costs will be used for energy efficiency projects at Carbullido Elementary School and the George Washington and Southern High Schools. In addition, some funds will be used at other schools, yet to be determined, for energy audits and an energy efficiency conference through the Guam Energy Office grant award.

How much will it cost?

Current contract costs are totaling \$1,933,374.

When will it be completed?

The projects for Carbullido, GW and Southern schools are expected to be completed by Summer 2019. The project under the Guam Energy Office must be completed before December 2020.

What is its funding source?

Of the total contract cost, \$1,311,100 or 68% is grant funded. \$500,000 is from the bond refinancing savings which was approved by CCU and PUC in January 2018. The balance of funds which would dependent on the grant award for the Electric Bus will be paid through CIP in FY 2020.

CONTRACT FOR TECHNICAL SERVICES

This CONTRACT is made and entered into on the <u>15th day of May, 2017</u>, by **SIEMENS INDUSTRY, INC.**, hereinafter called the CONSULTANT, and the Guam Power Authority, hereinafter called GPA.

GPA engages the CONSULTANT to perform technical services for a project known and described as Partnering Opportunities for the Development of Demand-Side Energy Conservation Programs and Utility Energy Services Contract Programs, <u>GPA-RFP-16-013</u>, hereinafter called the "Project."

SECTION I - SERVICES OF THE CONSULTANT

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The CONSULTANT shall perform the following technical services in accordance with the degree of care and skill that a registered professional in Guam would exercise under similar conditions:

- A. GPA and the CONSULTANT have entered into this contract, wherein GPA will call upon a task and discuss scope and schedule with the CONSULTANT. The CONSULTANT shall provide services as described in the task list provided in Exhibit A. This list is not all-inclusive; GPA can negotiate tasks so long as it falls under the scope of Demand-Side Energy Conservation Programs and Utility Energy Services Contracts.
- B. The CONSULTANT has assigned <u>Mike Hubbard, SIEMENS' Senior Project Manager</u>, as the Project Manager for this CONTRACT. Prior written approval is required in the event the CONSULTANT needs to change the Project Manager. The CONSULTANT shall submit the qualifications of the proposed substituted personnel to GPA for approval.
- C. The CONSULTANT shall submit all final documents in both hard copy and electronic format. The software version used shall be compatible to current GPA standards.

SECTION II - CONTRACT PERIOD

GPA and the CONSULTANT have agreed that this CONTRACT will be effective <u>June 1st</u>, 2017 for a base contract period of five years or until all of the tasks in Exhibit A are completed. Upon mutual agreement, the CONTRACT may be extended for a period no more than five years beyond the base contract term. GPA shall, at its sole discretion, determine task completion.

SECTION III - CONSULTANT'S COMPENSATION

The CONSULTANT's compensation for this CONTRACT shall be obtained from the customer, through savings generated from the effective implementation of demand-side energy conservation programs and Utility Energy Services Contracts. A portion of the savings generated through these programs and contracts shall be allocated to pay for the services the CONSULTANT has provided.

Compensation structure shall be developed by CONSULTANT for each project implemented, based on generated savings, and shall be included in the proposal during the design and construction of each

project. Compensation structure should meet the approval of GPA and DoD or any other federal agency to whom GPA and the CONSULTANT shall provide the programs and contracts.

SECTION IV - CONSULTANT'S STATUS

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The CONSULTANT agrees that there shall be no employee benefits occurring from this CONTRACT, such as:

- A. Insurance coverage provided by GPA;
- B. Participation in the Government of Guam retirement system;
- C. Accumulation of vacation or sick leave;
- D. There shall be no withholding of taxes by GPA;
- E. That it is expressly understood and agreed that, in the performance of services under this CONTRACT, the CONSULTANT and its employees shall at all times act as independent CONSULTANTs with respect to GPA, and not as an employee or agent of GPA. Further, it is expressly understood and agreed by the parties that nothing contained in this CONTRACT shall be construed to create a joint venture, partnership, association, or other affiliation or like relationship and shall remain that of independent parties to a contractual relationship set forth in this CONTRACT.

SECTION V -- GUAM POWER AUTHORITY'S RESPONSIBILITIES

- A. GPA shall designate a project manager during the term of this CONTRACT. The project manager has the authority to administer this CONTRACT and shall monitor compliance with all terms and conditions stated herein. All requests for information from or a decision by GPA on any aspect of the work shall be directed to the project manager.
- B. GPA shall review submittals by the CONSULTANT and provide prompt response to questions and rendering of decisions pertaining thereto, to minimize delay in the progress of the CONSULTANT'S work. GPA will keep the CONSULTANT advised concerning the progress of GPA's review of the work. The CONSULTANT agrees that GPA's inspection, review, acceptance or approval of CONSULTANT'S work shall not relieve CONSULTANT'S responsibility for errors or omissions of the CONSULTANT or its sub-consultant(s).
- C. Unless included in the CONSULTANT'S Services as identified in Section I, GPA shall furnish the CONSULTANT gratis, the following information or services for this Project:
 - 1. Available GPA data relative to policies, regulations, standards, criteria, studies, etc., relevant to the Project.

SECTION VI - INVOICING AND PAYMENT TERMS & CONDITIONS

This is a revenue-neutral, zero-cost contract, and GPA shall not be invoiced for any services provided by the CONSULTANT related to Demand-Side Management Program and Utility Energy Services Contract activities.

Upon the finalization of the contract for this RFP, GPA and the CONSULTANT shall create Demand-Side Energy Conservation and UESC Programs that shall be proposed to the DoD and any other federal agency. These programs shall include Invoicing and Payment Terms based on Energy Savings realized by

DoD or the federal agency through the implementation of the Demand-Side Energy Programs and UESC Programs. The CONSULTANT shall properly keep track of all invoices including supporting documents (i.e. timesheets, shipping invoices, consumable listings). All supporting documents must be regularly reviewed and approved by the GPA Project Manager prior to invoice submittal for charges. Once DoD has approved the programs proposed by GPA and the CONSULTANT, invoicing shall commence based on the Payment Terms and Conditions proposed by the CONSULTANT. All invoices will be paid net 30 days from date invoice is received at the GPA Accounting Department. Payment shall be made using a method mutually agreed upon by GPA and the CONSULTANT.

SECTION VII - TERMINATION

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The Procurement Officer may, when the interest of GPA or the Territory so require, terminate this contract in whole or in part, for the Convenience of the Territory. The Procurement Officer shall give written notice of the termination to the CONSULTANT specifying the part of the contract terminated and when termination becomes effective. **[GSA Procurement Regulations 6-101.10.]**

Immediately after receiving such notice, the CONSULTANT shall discontinue advancing the services under this CONTRACT and proceed to close said operations under this CONTRACT. The CONSULTANT shall appraise the services it has completed and submit an appraisal to GPA for evaluation. GPA shall have the right to inspect the CONSULTANT'S work to appraise the services completed.

CONSULTANT shall deliver to GPA all drawings, special provisions, field survey notes, reports, estimates and any and all other documents or work product generated by the CONSULTANT under the CONTRACT, entirely or partially completed, together with all unused materials supplied by GPA.

In the event of such termination or abandonment, the CONSULTANT shall be paid for services performed prior to receipt of said notice of termination including reimbursable expenses then incurred.

If the remuneration scheduled hereunder is based upon a fixed fee or definitely ascertainable sum, the portion of such sum payable shall be proportionate to the percentage of services completed by the CONSULTANT based upon the scope of work set forth in Exhibit A, and shall be agreed upon mutually by the CONSULTANT and GPA. However, in no event shall the fee exceed that set forth in Section III.

GPA shall make final payment within thirty (30) days after the CONSULTANT has delivered the last of the partially completed items and the final fee has been agreed upon.

In the event this CONTRACT is terminated, GPA shall have the option of completing the work, or entering into a contract with another party for the completion of the work according to the provisions and agreements herein.

SECTION VIII – CHANGES

GPA may at any time, by written order ("Change Order"), make any changes or deletions in the services to be performed hereunder. If such changes or deletions cause an increase or decrease in the costs of doing work under this CONTRACT, or in the time required for this performance, an equitable adjustment shall be made as agreed to by the parties and the CONTRACT shall be modified in writing accordingly. CONSULTANT shall have no obligation to perform any Change Order work until the parties reached an agreement on the equitable adjustment of CONSULTANT's compensation and/or time for performance.

SECTION IX – ASSIGNMENT OF AGREEMENT

The CONSULTANT may not assign this CONTRACT, or any sum becoming due to under the provisions of this CONTRACT, without the prior written consent of GPA which consent shall not be unreasonably withheld, provided, however, that no consent will be required if, as a result of a corporate reorganization an affiliate of the CONSULTANT becomes the CONSULTANT's successor in interest.

SECTION X – FORCE MAJEURE

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Neither party shall be liable for any delay in meeting or failure to meet its obligations under this CONTRACT due to a *Force Majeure*.

Force Majeure referred to herein shall mean an occurrence beyond the control and without the fault or negligence of the party affected including, but not limited to, acts of God or the public enemy, expropriation or confiscation; changes in law procedures, war, rebellion, or riots; floods, unusually severe weather that could not reasonably have been anticipated; fires, explosions, epidemics, catastrophes, or other similar occurrences which are not within the control of the party affected. However, the following shall not be considered as *Force Majeure*:

- a) Delay caused by lack or inability to obtain raw materials, congestion at CONSULTANT's or its subcontractor's facilities, or elsewhere; market shortages, or similar occurrences, or
- b) Delay, either on the part of THE CONSULTANT or its subcontractors, caused by shortages of supervisors or labor, inefficiency, or similar occurrences, or
- c) Sabotage, strikes, or any other concerted acts of workmen, which occur only in the facilities of THE CONSULTANT or its subcontractors.

Should the circumstances of *Force Majeure* continue over a period of ninety (90) days, GPA has the right, if no other understanding is reached, to terminate the whole Agreement or any part thereof. Any delay or failure in performing the obligations under the Contract Documents of the parties hereto shall not constitute default under this CONTRACT or give rise to any claim for damages or loss or anticipated profits if, and to the extent, such delay or failure is caused by Force Majeure, and if a claim is made therefore.

SECTION XI - TAXES

The CONSULTANT shall be liable for Guam Gross Receipt Taxes and all other applicable taxes and duties. GPA shall have no tax liability under this order. Specific information on taxes may be obtained from the Director of Revenue and Taxation.

GPA is a government agency exempted from ALL government taxes as stipulated in the Guam Code Annotated.

SECTION XII - NOTICES

Any notice, demand or other document required or permitted to be delivered hereunder shall be in writing and may be delivered personally (not to include facsimile transmission) or shall be deemed to be delivered when received postage prepaid, registered or certified mail, return receipt requested, addressed to the parties at their respective address as specified herein:

SECTION XIII - GOVERNING LAW

The validity of this CONTRACT and any of its terms or provisions, as well as the rights and duties of the parties to this CONTRACT, shall be governed by the laws of Guam, and the Federal Acquisition Regulation (FAR), in cases where FAR preempts the laws of Guam.

SECTION XIV - SUPPLEMENTAL CONTRACT PROVISIONS

There are no supplemental contract provisions to this Contract.

SECTION XV - INDEMNIFICATION

The CONSULTANT shall indemnify and hold GPA harmless from any claim, liability or product liability, loss, damage, demand, cause of action or suit, expense, or reasonable fee of legal counsel to the extent resulting from negligent acts or omissions of the CONSULTANT, including its employees, agents and subcontractors.

SECTION XVI - LIMITATION OF LIABILITY

UNLESS OTHERWISE PROVIDED IN THE APPLICABLE TASK ORDER, NEITHER PARTY IS LIABLE TO THE OTHER, WHETHER BASED IN CONTRACT, WARRANTY, TORT (INCLUDING NEGLIGENCE), STRICT LIABILITY, INDEMNITY OR ANY OTHER LEGAL OR EQUITABLE THEORY, FOR: LOSS OF USE, REVENUE, SAVINGS, PROFIT, INTEREST, GOODWILL OR OPPORTUNITY, COSTS OF CAPITAL, COSTS OF REPLACEMENT OR SUBSTITUTE USE OR PERFORMANCE, LOSS OF INFORMATION AND DATA, LOSS OF POWER, VOLTAGE IRREGULARITIES OR FREQUENCY FLUCTUATION, CLAIMS ARISING FROM BUYER'S THIRD PARTY CONTRACTS, OR FOR ANY TYPE OF INDIRECT, SPECIAL, LIQUIDATED, PUNITIVE, EXEMPLARY, COLLATERAL, INCIDENTAL OR CONSEQUENTIAL DAMAGES, OR FOR ANY OTHER LOSS OR COST OF A SIMILAR TYPE. UNLESS OTHERWISE PROVIDED IN THE APPLICABLE TASK ORDER, CONSULTANT'S MAXIMUM LIABILITY UNDER THIS CONTRACT SHALL BE LIMITED TO THE AMOUNT PAID TO THE CONSULTANT UNDER THAT TASK ORDER.

SECTION XVII – WORK PRODUCT DELIVERABLES

A. For the purposes of this Article "Intellectual Property" shall mean all trade secrets, patents and patent applications, trademarks (whether registered or unregistered and including any goodwill acquired in such trademarks), services marks, trade names, internet domain names, copyrights (including rights in computer software), moral rights, database rights, design rights, rights in know-how, rights in inventions (whether patentable or not) including, but not limited to, any and all renewals or extensions thereof, and all other equivalent or similar rights which may subsist anywhere in the world, including, but not limited to, any and all renewals or extensions thereof.

B. For the purposes of this Article, "CONSULTANT's Pre-Existing Intellectual Property" shall mean any Intellectual Property: (i) that has been conceived or developed by an employee or subcontractor of CONSULTANT before CONSULTANT performs any services under this CONTRACT; (ii) that is conceived or developed by such employee or subcontractor at any time wholly independently of CONSULTANT performing services under this Contract.

C. All reports, drawings, field survey notes, special provisions, estimates and any other documents commissioned by or deliverable to GPA under this CONTRACT ("Work Product Deliverables") shall become GPA's property upon receipt by GPA. CONSULTANT may retain file copies of such Work Product Deliverables. All CONSULTANT's Pre-existing Intellectual Property that may be included in the Work Product Deliverables provided to GPA under this CONTRACT shall also remain CONSULTANT's property. CONSULTANT hereby grants GPA a royalty-free, non-transferable, perpetual, nonexclusive license to use any CONSULTANT's Pre-existing Intellectual Property solely as incorporated into the Work Product Deliverables provided to GPA under this CONTRACT. Under such license, GPA and the customer shall have a right to:

- (a) Use, in object code form only, any software that is owned or licensed by the CONSULTANT and that is included in the Work Product Deliverables ("Software Deliverables"); and
- (b) Use all such Work Product Deliverables, provided however, that such use shall be limited to the particular project and location for which the Deliverables are provided. Any reuse of such Deliverables for other projects or locations without the written consent of the CONSULTANT will be at user's risk and without liability to the CONSULTANT.
- (c) In consideration of such license, GPA agrees not to reverse engineer any Work Product Deliverables to discover any source code, object code, firmware, underlying ideas, or algorithms of such Deliverables.

SECTION XVIII - HAZARDOUS MATERIALS

A. For the purposes of this Article, "Hazardous Materials" means any material, substance, or waste, that, by reason of its composition or characteristics, is hazardous to human health and/or the environment, including any "solid waste" or "hazardous waste," as those terms are defined by the Resource Conservation and Recovery Act of 1976, as amended, any "hazardous substance," as that term is defined by the Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation and Liability Act of 1980, as amended, and any other hazardous, toxic or radioactive chemical, waste, byproduct, pollutant, contaminant, compound, product, material or substance, including without limitation, Asbestos, Asbestos containing materials ("ACM"),

Contract for Technical Services GPA-RFP-16-013 polychlorinated biphenyls, petroleum (including crude oil or any fraction or byproduct thereof), hydrocarbons, radon, urea, urea formaldehyde, and any other material that is prohibited, controlled, limited or regulated in any manner under any Environmental Laws.

B. CONSULTANT's services under this CONTRACT shall not include, either directly or indirectly, performing or arranging for the detection, monitoring, handling, storage, removal, transportation, disposal, or treatment of Hazardous Materials. In the event that CONSULTANT encounters any Hazardous Materials or other hazardous conditions at a project site, CONSULTANT shall immediately stop work in the area affected and report the condition to customer and GPA. CONSULTANT shall not have any liability arising from pre-existing Hazardous Materials present or howsoever occurring at, on or under a project site. To the extent that such Hazardous Materials impact CONSULTANT's schedule or cost to complete the work, CONSULTANT shall be entitled to a scope Change Order for such impact.

SECTION XIX – DISPUTES

All controversies between GPA and the CONSULTANT which arise under, or are by virtue of, this CONTRACT and which are not resolved by mutual agreement, shall be resolved under Guam Procurement Law and the Government Claims Act, and pursuant to the laws of Guam.

SECTION XX - RELEASE OF INFORMATION

The CONSULTANT shall not release any information, including the contract price; concerning this project or any part thereof in any form, including advertising, news releases, or professional articles, without written permission from GPA.

SECTION XXI - INSURANCE

The CONSULTANT shall not commence work under this CONTRACT until he has obtained reasonable insurance for Auto Liability and Worker's Compensation and Employer's Liability up to the statutory limits. The CONSULTANT shall maintain all insurance required during the course of the work.

SECTION XXII - LICENSING

CONSULTANTS are reminded that GPA will not consider for award any offer submitted by a CONSULTANT who has not complied with the Guam Licensing Law. Specific information on licenses may be obtained from the Director of Revenue and Taxation.

SECTION XXIII - CONVENANT AGAINST CONTINGENT FEES

The CONSULTANT warrants that it h as not employed any person to solicit or secure any resultant contract upon agreement for a commission, percentage, brokerage, or contingent fee. Breach of this warranty shall give the Guam Power Authority the right to terminate the CONSULTANT, or in its discretion, to deduct from the Contract price or consideration the amount of such commission, percentage, brokerage, or contingent fees. This warranty shall not apply to commission payable by CONSULTANTs upon contracts or sales secured or made through, bona fide established commercial or selling agencies maintained by the CONSULTANT for the purpose of securing business.

SECTION XXVI -- EQUAL EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITY

Section 3.01 of the Executive Order 10935 dated March 07, 1965 requires the CONSULTANT not to discriminate against an employee or applicant for employment because of race, creed, color or national origin. The CONSULTANT will take affirmative action to ensure that applicants are employed and that employees are treated equally during employment without regard to race, creed, color or national origin.

SECTION XXV - AMERICAN DISABILITIES ACT

Hafa Adai! The Guam Power Authority (GPA) submits for this grant opportunity its Demand-Side Management Program Expansion Project. Our Demand-Side Management program, also known as the Energy Sense Program has Energy Efficiency Initiatives that GPA offers as rebate incentives for our customers. The Program currently offers rebates for Energy Star Washer & Dryer Units, Energy Star Window-Type Air Conditioning, and qualifying AHRI-certified Ducted and Ductless-Split Air Conditioning.

Since the re-launch of the rebate program, GPA has paid out over \$M1 in rebates for over 3,200 submitted applications as of March 2018. With the anticipated population boom on-island due to the import of Marine Soldiers to Guam, the Authority has embarked on DSM efforts in able to manage the expected increase in load with the replacement of inefficient and near-obsolete appliances and equipment with those that are third-party certified to be energy-efficient.

Issues for Decision

Resolution No. 2019-08

Relative to LEAC

What is the project's objective? Is it necessary and urgent?

The Guam Public Utilities Commission (GPUC) has established a Tariff under which the Guam Power Authority (GPA) is allowed to recover its fuel costs and fuel related costs under a factor which is reset and trued up every (6) six months through the Levelized Energy Adjustment Clause (LEAC). The deadline for the next filing is June 15, 2019. For the LEAC period covered from February 1, 2019 through July 31, 2019, GPA requested to maintain the LEAC rate of \$0.154242/kWh that was approved by the CCU and GPUC.

The average market price of fuel in the initial filing for the current period was approved at \$66.73/bbl for the (6) six-month period ending July 31, 2019, the current projection for the same period is \$72.87/bbl and the projected price of fuel for the period ending January 31, 2020 is \$74.18/bbl;

Although GPA will file the required LEAC schedules, it has determined that it will not petition for a change in the LEAC factor for secondary voltage service customers as well as alternative voltage customer for the period of August 1, 2019 to January 31, 2020.

How much will it cost?

The LEAC rate to **remain at \$0.154242/kWh** effective for the period from August 1, 2019 thru January 31, 2020.

Based on this status quo approach, an under-recovery of about **\$9.7M** is anticipated by the end of the LEAC period on January 31, 2020 which will have some impact on the working capital and other financial ratios; however. GPA will be able to manage in a short-term period.
